Thoughts From Our Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Our Gospel today talks about grace. *Grace* is a free gift that God gives each one of us unconditionally. Even though grace is given unconditionally, God respects our freedom and never imposes things on us. However, in some cases some people choose to accept grace and others refuse it. Those who accept the grace that is freely given by God are transformed to lead a life in conformity with Christ. For those who reject the grace offered to them, grace has no value or has no impact on their life. We are all in need of

grace because we have sinned; and I have no idea or any reason why someone would refuse a gift that is given to them freely and which will have an effect on their lives. Even if you reject the grace that is given to you, God does not lose hope in you. He continues to come to you and find a way of helping you until you accept grace or reject it.

In today's parable, Jesus says that the kingdom of heaven is like "a landowner that went out and hired workers for his vineyard. Some he hired early in the day, telling them that he would pay them the usual daily wage. He went back at various times of the day and found more workers waiting to be hired. Each time as he hired those that were there, he told them that he would pay them what was right."

Brothers and sisters in Christ, we are not told why some had not found work till the evening, or if they had shown up at the marketplace late, as no other details are given. At the end of the day, the owner came to pay the workers. He began paying those that were last to be hired and paid them a full daily wage. I am sure those that had been working the entire day were excited. Maybe they thought they were going to be paid more. When they received the same pay for working the entire day as those that had only worked for an hour, I suspect they were not happy folks. When the landowner heard them grumbling, he tried to explain to them that he was not unfair at all. He gave them what they had agreed upon. He did not see the reason why they were unhappy as it was his money. The landowner paid as they had agreed. He had a responsibility to use his money as he liked. In this Gospel, the landowner is God, the workers are us, and the pay received is the kingdom of heaven earned after working for it for a long time or a short time. Grace cannot be compared with fairness. Grace is about mercy. God loves us and mercifully gives us more than we deserve at times. God's grace is for everybody and does not exclude anyone, and He is the one Who decides whoever He gives grace at any time of the day. We should be comfortable with what we have been given. Those who have been attending church for a long time and those who began going to church recently should not be tempted to think that they are more special than others.



First Reading: Ezekiel 18:25-28

Second Reading: Philippians 2:1-11

While he was in prison, the Philippians had sent someone to bring money for his support and to stay with him. Paul thanks them by quoting an early Christian hymn which he felt described Christ as a model for the way all Christians should live.



Baby Bottle Project



Next weekend of **September 30th -October 1st-** our church will be participating in *The Baby Bottle Project* benefiting *The Women's Centers of Greater Chicagoland*.

You may not realize this but *The Women's Center* is probably the last resource many women have to help them choose life for their baby.

Sadly, if The Women's Center didn't exist, most of the women who previously visited our facilities, probably wouldn't have brought their babies into the world. But because of our establishment, and Life Saving Work, our organization has helped save almost 40,000 babies in 32 years.

Now to help you visualize 40,000 babies, just think of a Major Big Ten University campus, like Michigan State, which has around 42,000 students. So basically that's like saying the entire student body of the campus is here today because of our work! Needless to say, that's a lot of babies we have saved!

And while The Women's Center does fantastic work, you have to remember that there are almost 3,600 babies being aborted daily in the United States alone. If you do some quick math, and take just 2 weeks, and multiply that by 3,600 babies, that equates to 50,400 babies being aborted every 14 days!!!!
