Thoughts From our Pastor Rev. George O. Omwando



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today we celebrate Palm Sunday, the final Lenten Sunday, when Christians celebrate the triumphal entry of Jesus Christ into Jerusalem, the week before His death and resurrection. Palm Sunday, often referred to as "Passion Sunday," marks the beginning of Holy Week, which concludes on Easter Sunday. The Bible reveals that when Jesus entered Jerusalem, the crowds greeted Him by waving a and acyceing His path with them or with their clocks.

palm branches and covering His path with them or with their cloaks.

Immediately following this great time of celebration in the ministry of Jesus, He begins His Journey to the Cross. The context of the story is the commemoration of the Passover when all pilgrims come to Jerusalem to remember their liberation from bondage in Egypt. You can imagine the excitement that was surrounding this event. Think of a St. Patrick's Day parade or the Bud Billiken parade celebrations. All the pilgrims came on foot except Jesus who entered the city riding a colt like a messianic king (Zechariah 9:9). He rode this colt which no one had ridden before, symbolizing purity or the holiness of Jesus. If Jesus came today, perhaps we would spread a red carpet for him as we do at the award ceremonies, or when an important person like a president comes to town. I wonder whether they understood what they were doing. They also praised Him with an acclamation, "Hosanna" meaning, "save us, we pray."

In this final week of Lent, we reflect on the kind of savior Jesus Christ is for us. The answer to this question lies in our today's second reading (Philippians 2:6-11) where we find Him to be humble, one who took the form of a slave; and because of His lowly nature, God exalted His name above all other names. Even though Jesus was God Himself, He came to us in the form of a slave so that He could save us from our sins. Notice here that we have not been saved by a military person or a powerful king but by a humble Son of God. We have a savior who was condemned as a thief, nailed on the cross, suffered, and abandoned. But even at the deepest sufferings, He did not abandon us to those who put him on the Cross. For our sake, He became human so that He could show us the way to the Father. God raised Him because He was willing to be put down for us.

Jesus is our savior who was obedient to God and who offered Himself for us because of our sins, and who continues to show us the example that we need to follow. The best way to enter Holy Week is to show others the example of Jesus of Love, Peace, Thanksgiving and Hope.



APRIL 1, 2018 – EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

First Reading: Acts 10: 34,37-43

The Apostle Peter was originally skeptical about preaching the Gospel to non-Jews. But one day, the Holy Spirit summoned him to preach to a Gentile—the pagan army officer Cornelius and his household. Today's passage is a portion of Peter's sermon which summarizes the life and ministry of Jesus.

Second Reading: Col. 3:1-4

The letter to the Colossians depicts Christ as the only mediator between God and the world. A previous passage of the letter presented baptism as they way we are united with Christ. The author will today remind us of the heights to which Christ has raised us, and then call upon us to live up to this.

How Much for the Easter Offering?


Sometimes people will ask, 'What is a good Easter Offering when I go to church at Easter?

Treasures From Our Tradition

For many centuries, Christian pilgrims have longed to walk in the footsteps of Jesus, and on Passion Sunday the eyes of the world are on the Via Dolorosa, the "Road of Sorrows," in Jerusalem. As soon as it became safe for Christians to worship in public in the fourth century, a way was marked out. It was changed a few times over the years, and today's usual route was sketched by the Franciscans six hundred years ago, although Anglicans and Byzantines have their own unique detours. Friday is the most favored day, although it is crowded then. Almost everyone begins at the Lion's Gate in the Muslim Quarter, and ends at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. It's less than a quarter mile, but it threads its way through crowded markets with souvenir shops and fast-food snacks. There are, just as in your parish church, fourteen stations along the way. The exact spots are not known, but what matters is the pilgrim's unique ability to see even an ordinary road in a teeming city as something more than meets the eye.



Passion

The contrast between the processional reading in today's liturgy and the proclamation of the Passion is striking. We are given a glimpse of how profoundly the word of God is fulfilled in Jesus.

First he must be hailed as the Messiah, the One who is to come. He must be acknowledged by all, though they do not know what they are saying. They think he is the promised king, a worldly king of the Jews who will free them from the Roman occupation. They do not yet understand, even the disciples, exactly where this triumphal procession is leading. In our lives, we too do not know where we are going. It is in faith that we can follow Christ wherever he may lead us, trusting that death is not the end, nor evil the victor.
