

Thoughts From our Pastor Rev. George O. Omwando



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In the Bible, the meaning of someone's name was very significant to their story. "Joshua" means "God saves." We can read about Joshua in Exodus, Numbers, Deuteronomy, and then in the Book of Joshua. These stories are about 2000 years old, but they still relate to us today because they have spiritual lessons we need to learn. This lesson is that we can have a great relationship with God and our neighbor by understanding and living in the new covenant through Jesus Christ.

In brief: Joshua was Moses' assistant, and then he succeeded Moses and led the Israelites into the Promised Land. Can you remember the childhood game, "Follow the Leader"? The idea was to mimic the antics of the person in front of you in the line of boys and girls winding through the neighborhood. Being a follower was all right, but being leader was the most fun, creating imaginative routes and tasks for everyone to copy. In real life, great leaders are rare. Often, men and women are elected or appointed to leadership positions, but then falter or fail to act. Others abuse their power to satisfy their egos, crushing their subjects and squandering resources. But without faithful, ethical, and effective leaders, people wander. For 40 years, Israel had journeyed a circuitous route through the wilderness, but not because they were following their leader. Quite the opposite was true: with failing faith, they had refused to obey God and to conquer Canaan. So they wandered. Finally, the new generation was ready to cross the Jordan River and possess the land. Joshua was chosen to be Moses' successor. The Book of Joshua records Joshua's leadership of the people of God as they finished their march and conquered the Promised Land. Joshua demonstrated his faith in God as he took up the challenge to lead the nation. In the reading today, Joshua gathers all the tribes, all the leaders and judges, and makes it clear that they are at a crossroads in life's journey. He tells them to put away the gods which their fathers had served on the other side of the river and in Egypt. He says: "Serve the LORD! And if it seems evil to you to serve the LORD, choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods which your fathers served that were on the other side of the River, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you dwell. But as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD." Hearing this, the Israelites professed that they would serve the LORD. Joshua learned a lot from Moses, but he wasn't following a man – he was following God, and he wanted more of God. He remained in the tent of meeting because he wanted to meet with God for himself; he wanted to know God, not via somebody else, but personally.

If you want to know more of God today then take time out to sit still in His presence on your own. Choose a time and place and get alone with God. Get up out of your bed in the morning, freshen up, and hear what God wants to say to you. Get your instruction from Him before you start the rest of your day. Brothers and sisters in Christ, more than ever before, parents, teachers, political leaders and everybody today: we need a few Joshuas to help us build God's kingdom here on earth.

Finally, I want to thank you for your support during this year's Mission appeals. I also wish to thank the arm of the fundraising committee who worked so hard during this year's "Night at the Races." And also let us welcome our teachers and students this week as they begin their new school academic year. God bless you.

Households in God's Service

In the ancient world, "household" was a wide-reaching concept. When Joshua today speaks of his household serving the Lord, he meant not just those people who lived inside his walls or those related to him by blood or marriage; he meant slaves or servants and their families, and anyone indebted to him in any way. Even his livestock and other possessions would be consecrated to service of God. In our world, we value allowing individuals their freedom to choose how they live, and wouldn't think of offering our pets to the service of God. But, as we discern our vocation as disciples baptized into Christ, we can come to realize how far-ranging the "households" of our lives still are: how we act toward our spouses, children, roommates or anyone we live with; our behavior with neighbors; or in public as we encounter many "strangers" every day in stores or traffic who suddenly are "next door" to us. How can we use our time, our resources, or gifts for selfless reasons rather than personal gain? No matter what life our witness to the Good News calls us to, we all have a "household" that must be consecrated to service of the Lord our God.

SEPTEMBER 2, 2018 – 22ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-8

The book of Deuteronomy contains a lengthy farewell speech of Moses as the people prepared to enter the Promised Land. Moses makes it clear that they are expected to remain faithful to the Lord after they have settled in their new land.



Second Reading: James 1:17-18, 21-22,27

Today and for the next four Sundays, we will read passages from the letter of James. Two points will be helpful background to today's passage. First: In the Jewish law, the first fruits of the harvest are given to God. This expresses the truth that the *whole* harvest ultimately belongs to God. Second: In the Old Testament, widows and orphans were classic examples of poor and defenseless people.

St. Rose of Lima



Saint Rose born in Lima, Peru on April 20, 1586 is the patroness of the Americas, indigenous people of the Americas, the secondary patroness of the Philippines; of gardeners; of florists; the Netherlands; and of India.

This South American Saint's real name was **Isabel**, but she was such a beautiful baby that she was called **Rose**, and that name remained. Rose worked hard to support her poor parents and she humbly obeyed them, except when they tried to get her to marry. That she would not do. Her love of Jesus was so great that when she talked about Him, her face glowed and her eyes sparkled. Rose had many temptations from the devil, and there were also many times when she had to suffer a feeling of terrible loneliness and sadness, for God seemed far away. Yet she cheerfully offered all these troubles to Him. In her last long, painful sickness, this heroic young woman used to pray:

“Lord, increase my sufferings, and with them increase Your love in my heart.”

St. Rose died August 24, 1617. Many miracles followed her death. She was beatified by Clement IX, in 1667, and canonized in 1671 by Clement X.

Treasures of Our Tradition

This is the height of vacation season, but as anyone who has ever been to Rome in the summer knows, no time to visit there! The city is sweltering, and in a pre-air-conditioned world long ago, Romans figured out that they needed a break in the surrounding hills. Even the pope clears out. His destination is usually Castelgandolfo, a lovely little hill town southeast of Rome, overlooking a tranquil lake. It has been a papal possession since about 1600, and in 1929, when most of the papal states were finally lost, the papal dwelling was given "extraterritorial rights," meaning that it is an extension of Vatican City and not under Italian rule. The Vatican observatory maintained telescopes here for decades, far from the glare of the city lights of Rome, but although the observatory offices remain here year round, the telescopes are in Arizona. Pope Francis spends less time here than his predecessors, though he still slows down the pace of his work in Rome.

Vacations can help us visit friends and relatives, and revive those human contacts that the pace of our lives keeps us from cultivating. The pope needs a break, and so do you. Vacation comes from a word meaning to empty oneself. There's still time to clear the calendar for at least one golden summer day even if you don't have a personal castle in the hills!
