Thoughts From our Pastor Rev. George O. Omwando



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today's readings are closely connected with the readings of last week. The theme of last Sunday's reading was discipleship and the cost associated with it. But there were also other overlapping themes, judgment and truth in last week's readings. Every day we make so many judgments, and surely some of them come in a rash simply because they are based on perceptions or culture or inherently biased. Sometimes we are not totally happy on judgments that people make on us or vice versa. Even though we know God to be forgiving, loving, caring etc. but also God in the Scripture is depicted as fiercely judgmental. God is like a good parent/s who loves his or her children but yet he or she needs to discipline them so that they can grow and become responsible Disciples of Christ or citizens.

In last week's gospel Jesus told His disciples that He came to set the earth on fire and He did not come to establish peace on earth but rather division that will see a family of five divided, three against two and two against three. This is a very scary message coming from Jesus who we know and love but this is another example of the image of Jesus Christ. His message of truth will bring division: those who accept it will follow him and those who don't will not follow Him. In the family, some people will find the message of Christ so challenging that they will ignore it or refuse to accept it; that is where the division lies. This message coming from Jesus who is our shepherd will eventually put him on the cross. Those who will accept it will continue to follow him and gain eternal life. The disciple's role is to try to win or bring many souls to God. Sin alienates us from God but God still loves us. In the Book of Romans 8:35, St. Paul says, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword?" I think sin is like a minor cut or an abrasion, if untreated it can be infected and cause real trouble to the rest of the body. If sin is not forgiven, it can cause a lot of challenges to the mystical body of Christ which is the church. The sacrament of reconciliation helps us to restore the grace that we have lost due to sin.

In the Gospel of today, Jesus advises us to strive to enter through the narrow gate. Again like, last week, Jesus shocked us by telling us that he came to bring division, today He is telling us to strive to enter the Kingdom of God prepared for us. Is Jesus out of his mind? Is He putting a lot of demands on us as He did with His disciples? The answer is no for those who accept his eternal message. In Mathew 7:13-14, Jesus contrasts the narrow gate that leads to life with a wide gate and easy road that leads to destruction.

Let us follow Christ not matter what happens in our lives. As we begin our school year, I ask you to pray for our teachers, parents, guardians and students that they may follow the voice of Christ. May God always bless your efforts as you struggle to enter through the narrow gate.

SEPTEMBER 1, 2019 - 22ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Sirach 3:17-18, 28-29

The book of Sirach was written by a wise teacher who lived 200 years before Christ. Sirach ran a school for young people in Jerusalem. In today's section, he gives his students a string of wise sayings to guide them in their conduct.



Second Reading: Hebrews 12: 18-19, 22-24

In today's reading from the letter to the Hebrews, the author contrasts two covenants. He begins with the covenant at Mount Sinai, which was ratified amid fire and darkness. Then he speaks of the new covenant established by Jesus at Mount Zion (which is another name for Jerusalem).

These writers have borne not only the burden of bloodshed but carry with them the stigma of simply being born female in a deeply patriarchal and conservative society.

If these women—who have been abused, beaten, persecuted because of their gender, threatened because they dare to speak their mind or receive an education—can offer love and forgiveness for their tormentors, it compels us to ask ourselves why we can't forgive the lesser evils, the marginal hurts, the brush of a misdeed, the imagined oversight. These writers may also inspire you to tend to the deep wounds that all of us human beings experience in this life, the traumas that many of us would rather forget or ignore. You may find that in the writing, there is healing. You will be inspired not only by the resilience of these women, but their courage to love, and not just for their country, but for us all. Their love seeps from the pages of this book into our souls."

Shelby Boblick will facilitate the sessions and supply the materials each week. No need to prepare in advance. We'll focus on a different topic each week. It matters not at all if you miss a week or several weeks. You are most welcome to join us when your schedule permits.

We'll offer duplicate sessions each Monday: one at 1 p.m. and another at 7:30 p.m. Please join us at whichever time suits your life. No need to come at the same time each Monday.
