Thoughts From our Pastor Rev. George O. Omwando



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On August 28^{th,} we celebrated the memorial of St. Augustine of Hippo, one of my favorite's saints because his life touches almost all of us. As Christians we are called to live like saints. Saints are ordinary people, people of everyday life. An examination of some of the saints shows us that some of them did not live a good life. They were some of the best sinners! Look at St. Paul, in his previous life; he was a fierce murderer who persecuted Christians. In the end and on his way to Damascus, Jesus Christ appeared to him and changed him. He began preaching to those who he had persecuted. Imagine if you were living at the time of St. Paul, you knew him and that his desire was to wipe away all Christians – and all of a sudden you begin hearing him preaching the Good News of the recently risen Lord. Could you have listened to him? Could you have trusted him? From Paul's example, we do have hope that in the eyes of God, there is nothing impossible. Saul who later became St. Paul became a great Apostle to Gentiles and a fierce defender of Christ. He will later face numerous persecutions in his missionary activities. I will encourage you to read the lives of saints and if necessary have a favorite saint. One who you can relate to.

St. Augustine of Hippo is the patron of brewers because of his conversion from a former life of loose living, which included parties, entertainment, and worldly ambitions. His complete turnaround and conversion has been an inspiration to many who struggle with a particular vice or habit they long to break. This famous son of St. Monica was born in Africa and spent many years of his life in wicked living and in false beliefs. Though he was one of the most intelligent men who ever lived and though he had been brought up a Christian, his sins of impurity and his pride darkened his mind so much, that he could not see or understand the Divine Truth anymore. Through the prayers of his holy mother and the marvelous preaching of St. Ambrose, Augustine finally became convinced that Christianity was the one true religion. Yet he did not become a Christian then, because he thought he could never live a pure life. One day, however, he heard about two men who had suddenly been converted on reading the life of St. Anthony, and he felt terribly ashamed of himself. "What are we doing?" he cried to his friend Alipius. "Unlearned people are taking Heaven by force, while we, with all our knowledge, are so cowardly that we keep rolling around in the mud of our sins!" Augustine was later baptized, became a priest, a bishop, a famous Catholic writer, founder of an order of religious priests, and one of the greatest saints that ever lived. He became very devout and charitable, too. On the wall of his room he had the following sentence written in large letters: "Here we do not speak evil of anyone." St. Augustine overcame strong heresies, practiced great poverty and supported the poor, preached very often and prayed with great fervor right up until his death. "Too late have I loved you!" he once cried to God, but with his holy life he certainly made up for the sins he committed before his conversion.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, to become a saint is not such difficult task, you only need to follow what the Gospel teaches us and share the gifts that God has given you. Finally, if you know someone who has never been baptized or who is interested in join our faith, please refer him or her to Fr. Patrick. We are accepting candidates that want to be baptized or fully received in the Catholic Church in Easter Vigil next year. God bless you all.



SEPTEMBER 8, 2019 - 23RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Wisdom 9:13-18

The book of Wisdom was written by a teacher who lived in Alexandria, Egypt, a center for Greek philosophy in the ancient world. Fearful that the Jewish people might be captivated by this secular wisdom, the author contrast it with the rich spiritual wisdom found in Jewish religious traditions. The ninth chapter presents a prayer of Solomon for wisdom, and today's readings is an excerpt from this prayer.



Second Reading: Philemon 9-10, 12-17

Philemon was a rich man with many slaves, one of whom — Onesimus escaped. Onesimus reached Paul in prison and converted to Christianity. In sending Onesimus back to Philemon, Paul gave him a letter to take with him, a portion of which we hear today.

These writers have borne not only the burden of bloodshed but carry with them the stigma of simply being born female in a deeply patriarchal and conservative society.

If these women—who have been abused, beaten, persecuted because of their gender, threatened because they dare to speak their mind or receive an education—can offer love and forgiveness for their tormentors, it compels us to ask ourselves why we can't forgive the lesser evils, the marginal hurts, the brush of a misdeed, the imagined oversight. These writers may also inspire you to tend to the deep wounds that all of us human beings experience in this life, the traumas that many of us would rather forget or ignore. You may find that in the writing, there is healing. You will be inspired not only be the resilience of these women, but their courage to love, and not just for their country, but for us all. Their love seeps from the pages of this book into our souls."

Shelby Boblick will facilitate the sessions and supply the materials each week. No need to prepare in advance. We'll focus on a different topic each week. It matters not at all if you miss a week or several weeks. You are most welcome to join us when your schedule permits.

We'll offer duplicate sessions each Monday: one at 1 p.m. and another at 7:30 p.m. Please join us at whichever time suits your life. No need to come at the same time each Monday.

St. Rose of Lima

Saint Rose born in Lima, Peru on April 20, 1586 is the patroness of the Americas, indigenous



people of the Americas, the secondary patroness of the Philippines; of gardeners; of florists; the Netherlands; and of India.

This South American Saint's real name was *Isabel*, but she was such a beautiful baby that she was called *Rose*, and that name remained. Rose worked hard to support her poor parents and she humbly obeyed them, except when they tried to get her to marry. That she would not do. Her love of Jesus was so great that when she talked about Him, her face glowed and her eyes sparkled. Rose had many temptations from the devil, and there were also many times when she had to suffer a feeling of terrible loneliness and sadness, for God seemed far away. Yet she cheerfully offered all these troubles to Him. In her last long, painful sickness, this heroic young woman use to pray:

"Lord, increase my sufferings, and with them increase Your love in my heart."

St. Rose died August 24, 1617. Many miracles followed her death. She was beatified by Clement IX, in 1667, and canonized in 1671 by Clement X.
