

Thoughts From our Pastor Rev. George O. Omwando



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today's story about the rich man and Lazarus is almost known by many. For us to understand the story of Lazarus and rich man, it is better to understand about heaven and purgatory. Heaven is a place of a good spirit. The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines purgatory as a "purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven," which is experienced by those "who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified" (CCC 1030). It notes that "this final purification of the elect . . . is entirely different from the punishment of the damned" (CCC 1031). The purification is necessary because, as scripture teaches, nothing unclean will enter the presence of God in heaven (Rev. 21:27) and, while we may die with our mortal sins forgiven, there can still be many impurities in us, specifically venial sins and the temporal punishment due to sins already forgiven. When we die, we undergo what is called the particular, or individual, judgment. Scripture says that "it is appointed for men and women to die once, and after that comes judgment" (Heb. 9:27). We are judged instantly and receive our reward, for good or ill. We know at once what our final destiny will be. At the end of time, when Jesus returns, there will come the general judgment to which the Bible refers, for example, in Matthew 25:31-32: "When the Son of man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate them one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats." In this general judgment all our sins will be publicly revealed (Luke 12:2-5). Jesus shares the story of a notably wealthy man, also known as a dive, who lived a life of extravagant luxury.

Laying outside the entrance of this rich man's house, though, was an exceptionally unfortunate man called Lazarus who only hoped "to eat what fell from the rich man's table." The rich man was very unsympathetic to the dilemma of Lazarus, offering him no love, help, or compassion. In time, they both met their mortal ends and passed on to the afterlife. Lazarus was welcomed into heaven, while the rich man was condemned to hell. Pleading to "Father Abraham" in heaven, the rich man asked that Lazarus come down from heaven to cool his tongue with a drop of water to reduce his "agony in this fire." The rich man additionally requested Abraham to send Lazarus back to earth as a warning to his brothers to atone for their sins; however, both requests were refused. Abraham told the rich man that if his brothers did not believe in Scripture, neither would they believe Lazarus, even if he came directly from heaven. This Bible story is a great and powerful reminder that we will pay for our sins on earth when we finally decease, therefore we should love and care for our fellow mankind. The problem, with rich man is that he was not concerned with his unfortunate friend, Lazarus. Most likely, he acquired his wealth in genuine way but by the very fact that he ignored his friend made him to miss heaven. One thing that we should bear in mind is that in hell, there is no second chance. It is final. May we try to use our talents, treasures and time to serve others? God bless you.

OCTOBER 6, 2019 - 27TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Habakkuk 1:2-3, 2:2-4

The book of the prophet Habakkuk is one of the smaller books of the Bible. He was contemporary of Jeremiah, and preached at the time when Babylon (modern-day Iraq) threatened to destroy Jerusalem. Today's passage is a dialogue between the prophet and the Lord.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14

Although the author attributes the second letter to Timothy to St. Paul, it was probably written by someone else as much as 30 years after Paul's death. This was an acceptable practice at the time. One important theme of this letter is the need to be faithful to the Gospel and not to be swayed by false teachings.


2019-2020 School Year..... We are Planting the Seeds of Growth!



How God Intends us to Live

Today's readings are again directed to believers, communities of faith. As in last week's reading, Amos confronts us with a condemnation of those whose lives are focused on pleasure and self-absorption. The psalm contrasts that focus with the Lord's—justice for the oppressed; food the hungry; freedom for captives; sight to the blind; raising of those who are bowed down; loving the just; protecting strangers, orphans, and the widow; and by doing so, thwarting the way of the wicked. Timothy urges the pursuit of righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. Luke tells the familiar tale of the wealthy man and the poor beggar at his doorstep, who experience life very differently in this world and in the next. We are once again being given clear indications about how God intends for us to live our lives.
