Thoughts from Rev. George O. Omwando, Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Our first reading today, comes from prophet Malachi. The book of Malachi forms a bridge between the Old Testament and the New Testament. Malachi paints a stunning picture of Israel's unfaithfulness that clearly shows the people to be worthy of punishment but woven throughout this message is hope—the possibility of forgiveness. Malachi's words reminded the Jews, God's chosen nation, of their willful disobedience, beginning with the priests including every person. He rebuked the people and the priests for neglecting the worship of God and failing to live according to His will. The priests were corrupt and there was no body who could lead God's people. The priest had become a stumbling block instead of spiritual leaders. The men were divorcing their wives and marrying pagan women. The people's relationship was broken because they failed to keep God's covenant and judgement and punishment would be theirs. Amid this wickedness, there was a faithful few—remnant who loved and honored God. God would shower his blessing upon these men and women. If our relationship with God is unimportant, we need to take stock of ourselves by setting aside our sinful habits, putting the Lord first, and giving God our best each day.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, every so often we are confronted with all the uncertainty that arises from the dawn of what seem to be evil days. One hundred years ago people wondered if the fierce battles of World War One represented the Apocalyptic Armageddon. Then came World War Two. At the end of World War Two the newspaper headlines screamed, 'Peace on Earth!' But that, even if it was ever true, was short-lived. In this century, the events of 9/11 seemed to unleash another age of terror—but still I hear the quiet voice of Jesus reassuring us: "but the end is not yet" (Luke 21:9). Remember, there were three new Emperors in Rome in the space of one year immediately before Titus' sack of Jerusalem, and his destruction of the Temple which the disciples had been so recently admiring (Luke 21:5-6). In Jesus' answer to the disciples' question about times and signs (Luke 21:7), He speaks of things which have always been, and which will always be—but the specific timing of all these things is known only to the Father (cf. Mark 13:32). Jesus warned his disciples and he warns us to take, "heed that we are not led astray," warned Jesus (Luke 21:8). Apocalyptic teachers will come and go, some claiming to come in Jesus' name, and some even claiming "I am He!" Dates are set for the end, and those dates come and go—but we are still here, and the end has not come. What we need is not to concentrate on the end of the world but to be faithful to God's promises and to listen to the voice of God, telling us to avoid evil and do good.

I would like to thank all those that worked so hard in making this year's Christmas Bazaar so inspiring and successful. The Christmas Bazaar as you know is our major source of fundraising and budgeting and so much time was spent planning and preparing for it. Even though it is one of our annual sources of fundraising, it is also a great social event. I was so happy to see and meet new friends at the luncheon. The camaraderie is superb and the food was great. It is not just thanking you, but the passion, the countless hours that you spent preparing for our event deserves so much praise and recognition. We are very grateful for all you who provided raffle gifts, those who participated in various sub-committees and for the enthusiasm and dedication shown. May God bless you for making it a reality!

Today's readings take a fearless look at reality and reach a conclusion that we all know: life is hard. The prophet Malachi preaches fire and brimstone, warning us that evildoers will perish in flames. Saint Paul offers his own warning to the Thessalonians: keep busy, but never become a busybody. He reminds Christians that the apostles themselves worked in "toil and drudgery" as a model for how we ought to contribute to our community. The Gospel returns to the apocalyptic tone of Malachi, describing the utter chaos of the end-times. We will know the end is near when violence, catastrophe, and hatred dominate the earth. But we must not fear! God's saving plan brings peace to our hearts. Malachi speaks of the sun's "healing rays," and Jesus himself promises to protect every hair on our heads.





First Reading: 2 Samuel 5:1-3

The two books of Samuel describe a time early in Jewish history when the 12 tribes were forming one nation under a single king. After the death of Saul, their first king, the tribes decided upon a successor, as we will hear in this reading.

Second Reading: Colossians 1:
12-20

In our age of space travel, there is sometimes speculation about Christ's place in the wider universe, particularly if life were found on other planets. Today's passage quotes an early Christian hymn which describes the kingship of Christ in cosmic terms.





Food for Thought...

Moses Shows the Way

Moses did rescue the Israelites from slavery in Egypt; led them to Canaan, God's Promised Land.

He felt quite unsuited for leading this nondescript group, but he knew it was at God's command.

Harsh bondage was suffered in Pharaoh's captivity, so Israelites embraced the Exodus. To lead and protect them was not his proclivity, yet later he showed them his hightechsodus: Moses was the first person with a tablet, downloading data, from a cloud.

Treasures of Our Tradition

We are faced with strong and disturbing readings today that hold a certain fascination, since they seem at first glance to be blueprints for future inevitable wars and hardship. A fundamentalist interpretation focuses on this aspect. Yet we hear them at our Sunday celebration of the Eucharist, which infuses them with hope and optimism. Rather than dreading the future, today's liturgy assures us that God is with us in all of life's inevitable trials, and that we have a role in shaping the outcome of human history. Occasionally, some Christians have attempted to decode these readings for an exact measure of the world's end, but they have thus far been disappointed.

"Nothing lasts forever" is a lyric from a Broadway show. Stars fall from the sky, leaves wither and fall, mountains wash into the sea, human projects and governments totter and collapse with great regularity. Today's liturgy opposes this idea as incomplete, reminding us that Christ has made a permanent change in human history, and that life in him is life forever. Rather than inviting us to throw in the towel, today's liturgy strengthens us for acts of goodness and grace in our families, communities, and world.
