

Thoughts From Rev. George O. Omwando, Pastor



"Slowly He rose, and the crowd fell silent. Those at the back leaned forward, straining to hear. The atmosphere was electric. He spoke, and his carefully chosen words flew like swift arrows and found their mark. The great man, a spokesman for God, was warning-and condemning. The crowd became restless-shifting positions, clenching fists, and murmuring. Some agreed with his message, nodding their heads and weeping softly, but most were hungry, and they began to shout back insults and threats."

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today's first reading comes from prophet Isaiah. The office of The Prophet was instituted during the days of Samuel, the last of the judges. Prophets stood with the priests as God's special representatives. The prophet's role was to speak for God, confronting the people and their leaders with God's command and promises. Because of this confrontational stance and the continuing tendency of people to disobey God, true prophets usually were not very popular. But though their message often went unheeded, they faithfully and forcefully proclaimed the truth.

Our first reading today comes from the book of Isaiah. It is the first of the writings of the prophet in the Bible, and prophet Isaiah is generally considered one of the great prophets. Isaiah called the people to turn from their lives of sin and warned them of God's judgment and punishment. But, like most prophets, he soon became unpopular because his messages were so difficult to hear. Isaiah had an active ministry for 60 years. In our first reading today, the prophet invited those that were thirsty to come and drink even those who had no money. All are invited to the Lord's Table because at the table of the Lord, God offers us free nourishment that feeds the soul. God's salvation is freely offered, but to nourish our souls we must eagerly receive it. We will starve spiritually without this food as surely we will starve physically without our daily bread.

In our Gospel today, Jesus multiplied five loaves and two fish to feed over 5,000 people. What He was originally given seemed insufficient, but in his hands it became more than enough. We often feel that our contribution to Jesus is meager, but he can use and multiply whatever we give him, whether it is talent, time or treasure. God invites everyone to come to Him, rich or poor are invited unconditionally to share God's graces. If we can heed this unconditionally invitation to God, then He gives grace that can transform our lives. In God, this grace is superabundance and freely given. Jesus does the same, in today's Gospel; he is moved with pity and compassion to the crowd which is hungry not only for physical food but spiritual nourishment. Jesus has left us the Eucharist to nourish our souls. All are invited to come to church to share God's meal. God bless you.

Our Deepest Needs

The word of God serves up a tremendous feast for us today. Isaiah beckons all who hunger and thirst to come to the Lord for satisfaction. The psalmist cries out, "The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs" (Psalm 145:16). Saint Paul tells us that nothing can separate us from the love of God. Finally, in the Gospel, we hear the story of the miraculous feeding of over five thousand people from a mere five loaves and two fish. Most of us have our material needs met on a day-to-day basis. These scriptures, nevertheless, have much to say to the contemporary believer. We must ask ourselves, "Where are my deepest hungers? Where are my thirsts?" After material needs are satisfied and, in some cases, over-satisfied, many people still experience a deep longing for spiritual balance and well-being. As the loaves and fish are multiplied in today's Gospel, perhaps our prayer can be a longing for the satisfaction of the deepest needs that only God can fill.

Significance of The Transfiguration

August 6

The transfiguration is one of the miracles of Jesus in the Gospels. This miracle is unique among others that appear in the canonical gospels, in that the miracle happens to Jesus himself. Thomas Aquinas considered the transfiguration "the greatest miracle" in that it complemented baptism and showed the perfection of life in Heaven. The transfiguration is one of the five major milestones in the gospel narrative of the life of Jesus, the others being baptism, crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension. In 2002, Pope John Paul II introduced the Luminous Mysteries in the rosary, which includes the transfiguration.




Praying for the Sick In Our Parish

SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

First Reading: 1 Kings 19: 11-13

The prophet Elijah lived about 800 years before Christ. Because he was loyal to God, he fell into disfavor with King Ahab and Queen Jezebel. He had to flee for his life to Mount Horeb (also known as Mount Sinai). As you listen to today's passage, it will be helpful to know that wind, earthquake, and fire were traditional Old Testament expressions of God's presence.

Second Reading: Romans 9:1-5

In chapters 9 to 11 of Paul's letter to the Romans, he addresses the painful question of why the majority of Jewish people failed to accept Christ. These were Paul's own people and he was personally hurt by this. He still loved his Jewish heritage and in today's passage he lists seven wonderful blessings that God's Old Testament people have received. He then adds an eighth: Christ the Messiah.

Each email will contain the link that is needed to sign up in our reservation system on *SignUp-Genius*.

NOTICE: We wanted to let everyone know that if you sign-up for Mass after Friday, they will not be on the sign-up sheets.

..#Please come 15 minutes before mass starts.

..#Enter the church by Austin Blvd. only.

..#Exit the church by Washington Blvd. only.

..#Mandatorily wear a mask.

..#Your hands will be sanitized once you enter the church.

..#Sign-up at the entrance.

..#From this weekend on, entrance to Sacristy's bathroom is prohibited.

..#You will be assigned where to sit within the church.

..#No congregational singing.

..#Avoid touching the pews.

..#Follow the signs inside the church.

..#Please sit on the pews that are marked.

..#No Sign of Peace is permitted.

..#You will receive a Worship Aid, which will be discarded after each mass.

..#Communion will be received only on your hands.

..#After Mass, sanitize your hands.

..#You are NOT allowed to gather or stay in church after mass.


