
Baptisms

Thoughts From Rev. George O. Omwando, Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Like the Easter Triduum of Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter that are all related, Halloween, All Saints day and All Souls are similarly related but surprisingly most Catholics are unaware. Almost, every Catholic knows the secular Holiday of Halloween. But not everybody knows that it derives from a holy day, All Saints' Day on November 1st, which is followed by All Souls' Day on November 2nd. The root word of Halloween - "hallow" - means "holy." The suffix "een" is an abbreviation of "evening." It refers to the Eve of All Hallows, the night before the Christian holy day that honors saintly people of the past.

All Saints is a celebration of the communion of saints, those people we believe are in heaven, through good works and God's grace. All Souls' Day is a day to pray for all souls. Among Catholics, prayers are offered for those in purgatory, waiting to get into heaven. On All Souls' Day, Catholic churches have a Book of the Dead, in which parishioners have an opportunity to write the names of relatives to be remembered. This book is placed near the altar, or at the entrance of the Church. This is done all through the month of November. It's an All Souls' tradition. More than a thousand years ago in Ireland and Britain, a common custom of Christians was to come together on the eve of the feast of All Hallows Day to ask for God's blessing and protection from evil in the world. Often, they would dress in costumes of saints or evil spirits and act out the battle between good and evil around bonfires. That's the source of the Christian concept of the importance of the individual soul underlies All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day, which are observed worldwide primarily in the Catholic and Anglican traditions. The "Dia de los Muertos," or "day of the dead," in hispanic countries keeps alive some of the tradition of honoring souls of the dead. All Hallows was considered a time when evil could manifest itself. We as Catholics do believe in the visible and the invisible. There is good and there is evil. There is invisible evil and invisible good. It's an acknowledgement of that existence. In the Catholic Church, Nov. 1 is a holy day of obligation, when all Catholics are expected to attend Mass and this year's All Saints Day falls on the Sunday. All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day are related, but they are two separate celebrations. On All Saints' Day there's a call to live as saints, to remind us how we're supposed to live. On All Souls' Day, we're talking about all souls and asking God's mercy for them. We're talking about those people who have died before us, and their process of getting to heaven, through Christ.

Finally, remember that next Sunday, there will be a second collection to support the retired priests of our Archdiocese. I ask you to be generous to this collection that will go in long to support the many issues that affect the retired priests of our Archdiocese. Baby bottles were also due last Sunday, keep on bring your filled baby bottle/s and place them in the basket provided in the back of the Church, and if you're unable to come, you can take the baby bottle/s to the rectory during office hours. God bless you.





Saint Martin De Porres | (1579-1639)

November 3

An old illustration pictures Martin de Porres, finger to his lips—"Shhhh!"—as several mice peek out of sacristy vestment drawers, preparing to join a rodent "procession" following him out of church! Martin's rescue of these unwelcome guests, and statues depicting him, broom in hand, feeding a dog, cat, bird, and mouse from the same dish symbolize his life and sanctity. Initially denied entrance by the Dominicans because of his mixed race (Spanish father, Panamanian mother), Martin cherished society's marginalized. For him, menial tasks, lovingly done, were sacred. Great and lowly alike feasted on his charity. Enemies were reconciled by this "poor mulatto" (his self-description), kind even to those whose racism demeaned him. Apprenticed to a surgeon-barber in his youth—thus patron saint of hair stylists and public health providers—Martin dispensed healing and dignity to Lima's poorest, serving in them the Christ he adored for hours in the Blessed Sacrament. By the time he died, all Peru called him Martin the Charitable, a title even those of us who will never be called "saint" might still aspire to.

NOVEMBER 8, 2020 — 32ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Wisdom 6:12-16

The book of Wisdom was written by a teacher who lived in Alexandria, Egypt, a center for Greek philosophy in the ancient world. Fearful that the Jewish people might be captivated by this secular thought, the author contrasts it with the true wisdom of God. In today's passage, wisdom is personified as a woman.

Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

Paul wrote his first letter to the Thessalonians some 20 years before any of the Gospels were written. In the passage we're about to hear, we have the earliest written teaching about the resurrection. Some of the Thessalonians were about those who had already died. They expected the second coming of Christ very soon, and were concerned that those who had died would miss out on the resurrection.

- ..#Please come 15 minutes before mass starts.
 - ..#Enter the church by Austin Blvd. only.
 - ..#Exit the church by Washington Blvd. only.
 - ..#Mandatorily wear a mask.
 - ..#Your hands will be sanitized once you enter the church.
 - ..#Sign-up at the entrance.
 - ..#From this weekend on, entrance to Sacristy's bathroom is prohibited.
 - ..#You will be assigned where to sit within the church.
 - ..#No congregational singing.
 - ..#Avoid touching the pews.
 - ..#Follow the signs inside the church.
 - ..#Please sit on the pews that are marked.
 - ..#No Sign of Peace is permitted.
 - ..#You will receive a Worship Aid, which will be discarded after each mass.
 - ..#Communion will be received only on your hands.
 - ..#After Mass, sanitize your hands.
 - ..#You are NOT allowed to gather or stay in church after mass.

..# Because they are specially called to this ministry of Acolyte, they should strive to live more fully by the Lord's sacrifice and to be molded more perfectly in its likeness;

..# They should seek to understand the deep spiritual meaning of what they do so to offer themselves daily to God as spiritual sacrifices acceptable to Him through Jesus Christ.

This year, Kevin continues to be involved in multi-dimensional study, prayer and preparation for possible Holy Orders. Academic and formation courses include Sacramental Theology, Foundations of Catholic Doctrine, Moral Theology, Liturgy and Rites Practicum, Homiletics, Spiritual Theology, Deacon's Role in Renew My Church; a retreat for candidates and wives; monthly meetings for theological reflection; monthly Spiritual Direction; and a retreat prior to his institution to the Ministry of Acolyte. He also has been involved in a series of field education experiences and is currently participating in a year-long parish liturgy internship experience. Thus, he continues his four-year preparation as a candidate for the diaconate. Presently, there are 500 active deacons in the Archdiocese of Chicago, and 40 men (accompanied by their wives, if married) currently participate in the Institute for Diaconal Studies.

Please keep Kevin, his wife Marci and family, and all those in formation and their families, in your prayers that they might continue to answer God's call in their lives.
