From Rev. George O. Omwando, Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Our first reading today talks about the call of Samuel and the Gospel reading also shows us what happened at the call of the first disciples of Jesus. I have found out that listening is so important in life and crucial to make relationships work. We all have built into us the need and want to be listened to. Being listened to communicate things like worth, value, love, and respect. How do you feel when you are pouring your heart out to a parent or a friend and then find out that they weren't listening to you? You feel hurt, upset, and like they don't care about you. Listening is so important and yet we live in a day and age where there are so many distractions to listening that it makes it more and more difficult to do.

Would you know God's voice if you heard it? Well Samuel certainly didn't. The scene in our first reading is pretty funny if you stop to think about it, God kept waking Samuel up and Eli keeps telling him to go back to sleep. In 1 Samuel 3:2ff we read, "And it came to pass at that time, while Eli was lying down in his place, and when his eyes had begun to grow so dim that he could not see, and before the lamp of God went out in the tabernacle of the LORD where the ark of God was, and while Samuel was lying down, (4) that the LORD called Samuel. And he answered, "Here I am!" So, he ran to Eli and said, "Here I am, for you called me." And he said, "I did not call; lie down again." And he went and lay down. Then the LORD called yet again, "Samuel!" So, Samuel arose and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." He answered, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." (Now Samuel did not yet know the LORD, nor was the word of the LORD yet revealed to him.) And the LORD called Samuel again the third time. So, he arose and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you did call me." Then Eli perceived that the LORD had called the boy."

I think the last thing that prevents us from listening to God is because we simply don't want to. God calls out to Samuel; he doesn't just start speaking. He finally delivers the message when Samuel responds to God and says, "Speak, your servant is listening." Samuel could have chosen – out of fear, out of not wanting to know what God had to say, or any other reason – to just ignore God but instead he choose to respond and purposefully listen to what God had to say.

God is speaking today whether you believe it or not. My challenge to all of us this week is to start listening. It is so important to make sure that we are taking time to "be still" and take the time to separate ourselves from the world and everything going on around us. This will help us to hear God's still, small voice and fresh our souls with what and how God sounds like. On top of all that, we must respond as God calls our name. He will not force Himself on us but instead wait for us to be ready and purposefully listen to His leading. The question is, are you ready? Finally, brothers and sisters, next month is our annual catholic appeal fundraising. Our Catholic Annual fundraising has been successful because of your generosity. It is my prayer that we will carry out the same generosity as we have done in the past years.

Speak Lord, We Are Listening

In today's first reading God keeps calling out in the night to a sleeping boy. Neither the boy, Samuel, nor his teacher, Eli, understands who is calling. But God's persistence convinces them. Samuel is then ready—not ready yet to do anything, but ready to listen. "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:10).

In the Gospel Jesus is out teaching. Various people notice him and begin to gather around. They soon become disciples and, like the young Samuel, are ready—not ready yet to do anything, but ready to listen. "Speak," they say, "we are listening."

God's voice is always with us, awake or asleep. It swirls around us like fog on a waterfront, enveloping us, gently urging us to wake up, to listen. Awareness of the voice comes first; then willingness to listen; then, in time, the decision to act, to live according to God's word. Let's ask today for the ability to keep our ears open so we don't miss God's voice.



JANUARY 24, 2021 — 3RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Jonah 3:1-5, 10

The Book of Jonah is only two pages long and tells a parable about a man called by God to preach repentance to the pagan city of Nineveh. Jonah's first response was to sail as fast as he could in the other direction. After his adventures with a large fish, God called him a second time. Today's passage picks it up from there.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 7:29-31

In this section of the first letter to the Corinthians, Paul responds to written questions they had sent to him. Some questions had to do with how we, who believed in the next life, should relate to the things of this life. Paul expected that Jesus would return in glory soon, so he gives some advice which we hear in this reading.

SCSL parishioners are encouraged to update us with your current e-mail in order to receive the weekly notifications of our reopened Sunday Masses and other liturgies as they are scheduled. Each email will contain the link that is needed to sign up in our reservation system on **SignUp-Genius**. **NOTICE:** We wanted to let everyone know that if you sign-up for Mass after Friday, they will not be on the sign-up sheets.

- ..#Please come 15 minutes before mass starts.
- ..#Enter the church by Austin Blvd. only.
- ..#Exit the church by Washington Blvd. only.
- ..#Mandatorily wear a mask.
- ..#Your hands will be sanitized once you enter the church.
- ..#Sign-up at the entrance.
- ..#From this weekend on, entrance to Sacristy's bathroom is prohibited.
- ..#You will be assigned where to sit within the church.
- ..#No congregational singing.
- ..#Avoid touching the pews.
- ..#Follow the signs inside the church.
- ..#Please sit on the pews that are marked.
- ..#No Sign of Peace is permitted.
- ..#You will receive a Worship Aid, which will be discarded after each mass.
- ..#Communion will be received only on your hands.
- ..#After Mass, sanitize your hands.
- ..#You are NOT allowed to gather or stay in church after mass.

Keeping the parish running with short staff -

While helping others in need during the pandemic, Rev. George Omwando has almost singlehandedly kept St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy Parish running during 2020.

The already small staff was reduced last year, after a staff member died, a musician departed, and Omwando's associate pastor retired. With parishes consolidating, he feared if he hired replacements, they might end up losing their jobs. "It is not right to hire a person if in one year he could lose his job," said Omwando.

In addition to taking on the responsibilities handled by staff, he has been navigating guidelines, streaming services online and working with banks to secure loans. He's been counseling overwhelmed parishioners, who have reached out more frequently than before the pandemic. And he still finds time to help neighbors, allowing people to use the church's address to have food delivered when their own homes are outside a restaurant's delivery area.

"As long as they tell me in advance. Otherwise, if they deliver the food and I'm hungry, I'm going to eat it," Omwando said with a smile.

He has dipped into the rectory's food supply to feed hungry neighbors in Austin. However, he had to make some difficult decisions in the name of safety, such as limiting the number of people who can attend funerals, which he finds not easy to do.

"I've made a lot of decisions that were not popular, but in the long run, these decisions are good."
