

From Rev. George O. Omwando, Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Trees snap like toothpicks or fly upward, wretched from the earth. Whole rooftops sail, cars tumble like toys, houses collapse, and a wall of water obliterates the shore and inundates the land. A hurricane cuts and tears, and only solid foundation survive its unbridled fury. But those foundations can be used for rebuilding after the storm. For any building, the foundation is critical. It must be deep enough and solid enough to withstand the weight of the building and other stresses. Lives are like buildings, and the quality of their foundation will determine the quality of the whole. Too often inferior materials are used and when the tests come, lives crush. Job was tested. With a life filled with prestige, possessions, and people, he was suddenly assaulted on every side, devastated, stripped down to his foundation. But his life was built on God, and he endured. Job was a prosperous farmer. He had thousands of sheep, camels, and livestock, a large family, and many servants. Suddenly, Stan the accuser came before God claiming that job was trusting God and only because he was wealthy, and everything was going well for him. And so, the testing of Job's faith began. Stan was allowed to destroy Job's children, servants, livestock, herdsmen, and home, but job continued to trust in God. Next Satan attacked Job physically, covering him with painful sores. Job's wife told him to curse God and die but Job suffered in silence. In his thinking Job's wish for death was similar to a poor servant or hireling that is tired with his work and wishes for the shadows of the evening, when he shall receive his pay and go home to rest. Job felt that all his days were useless and had been so for quite a while. He was wholly taken off from being able to do anything worthwhile. Every day was a burden to him because he was in no capacity of doing well. He could not fill up his time with anything that would turn to practical value. This he calls possessing months of vanity.

We learn from the story of Job that: God allowed Satan to test Job to prove that he did not serve God just for the good life that God had blessed him with. Job served God because he believed in the righteousness of God. It is not a great commitment to God to serve Him just when times are good! It seems like Job saw his life as above fault (and he was an upright person,) but towards the end of the book, God showed Job how little he knew and in comparison with a holy God, Job saw his need to repent. We are all guilty of sin and in need of the Savior, that God has provided in Jesus Christ. The book of Job is a great book for every generation and for us yet today. We can see the end of the story but at the moment Job could not. Job's faith clung to God through it all. He said, "Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him". That is true faith in the sovereignty of God, knowing that He will work things out for our eternal good if we commit our life to Him and follow His Word.

The Good News

Today's readings begin with a few verses from the book of Job. First, Job complains that his nights drag on endlessly. Then, worse yet, "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; / they come to an end without hope" (Job 7:6). Not exactly encouraging, these lamentations, not when taken alone.

Most of us have been there, though, and the antidote is the "good news" that Paul found so compelling that "an obligation has been imposed on me, and woe to me if I do not preach it!" (1 Corinthians 9:16). Paul felt driven to announce the gospel to as many people as possible, "to save at least some" (9:22).

This good news is the mystery of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, who lifted Simon Peter's mother-in-law from her sickbed with a mere touch of his hand. "The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons" (Mark 1:33–34)). Our woes and demons are as real as Job's, and Jesus is our savior.



FEBRUARY 14, 2021 — 6TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46

The third book of the Bible, Leviticus, is a collection of Jewish laws. Old Testament people believed that being clean or unclean (that is, kosher or non-kosher) was based on what was considered to be normal or abnormal. For example, because a snake slithered on the ground rather than walked, it was considered abnormal, and therefore unclean. By the same standards, people with disabilities or deformities were seen as unclean. We see a particular case addressed in this reading.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1

Today's passage concludes a long section of First Corinthians in which Paul has been addressing disputes between Jewish Christians and Gentile Christians about what foods are kosher. Paul now makes a general observation that while we may in principle be free to do this or that, we should avoid those things that disrupt harmony and peace.

Each email will contain the link that is needed to sign up in our reservation system on **SignUp-Genius**. **NOTICE:** We wanted to let everyone know that if you sign-up for Mass after Friday, they will not be on the sign-up sheets.

- ..#Please come 15 minutes before mass starts.
- ..#Enter the church by Austin Blvd. only.
- ..#Exit the church by Washington Blvd. only.
- ..#Mandatorily wear a mask.
- ..#Your hands will be sanitized once you enter the church.
- ..#Sign-up at the entrance.
- ..#From this weekend on, entrance to Sacristy's bathroom is prohibited.
- ..#You will be assigned where to sit within the church.
- ..#No congregational singing.
- ..#Avoid touching the pews.
- ..#Follow the signs inside the church.
- ..#Please sit on the pews that are marked.
- ..#No Sign of Peace is permitted.
- ..#You will receive a Worship Aid, which will be discarded after each mass.
- ..#Communion will be received only on your hands.
- ..#After Mass, sanitize your hands.
- ..#You are NOT allowed to gather or stay in church after mass.



We are looking to hire a Coordinator of Music who would be responsible for facilitating the musical worship life of the parish community by coordinating the activities delineated below:

- #Select and prepare sacred music for all church liturgies including Sunday and Holy Day Masses, civil holidays, and special liturgies.
- #Arrange for musical coverage for weekend Masses (accompanist and cantor).
- #Prepare cantors for Sunday Mass.
- #Work on sacramental celebrations in conjunction with school and religious education staff.
- #Meet with grieving families and offer guidance with regard to music selections for funerals.
- #Meet with engaged couples to provide guidance in selection of sacred music for their wedding liturgies.
- #Prepare worship aids for Weekend Masses, Triduum, Christmas, etc.
- #Assist in liturgy planning.
- #Demonstrate ability to play both piano and organ.
- #Demonstrate the ability to play instrument and sing at the same time when necessary.

There is also an interest in discussing potential candidate's knowledge of technology as related to video streaming and YouTube.
