From Rev. George O. Omwando, Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This year, we don't have students that are preparing for RCIA i.e. the rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and that is celebrated on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sunday's of Lent. If we had the RCIA students, they could have gone through the Scrutiny procedure. Scrutinies are ancient rites and they may, at first, seem strange to us. But they are profoundly rooted in our human experience. We need to examine (scrutinize) how we are, the areas of our lives where we are tempted, or seriously sin - in what we do and what we fail to do. We really need healing and the strength that can come from the support of our sisters and brothers.

The Lenten season is a time for spiritual recollection in preparation for the celebration of the paschal mystery. Even though we don't, have RCIA candidates, I have taken the Gospel of year A to reflect on. In the Gospel today, when a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Will you give me a drink? The Samaritan woman said to him, 'You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan woman. How can you ask me for a drink?' (For Jews do not associate with Samaritans). For a Jewish man to speak to a woman in public was a definite breach of social custom. Many Jewish men would not even speak to their wives in public! (Why?) The Jews considered the SAMARITAN immoral for she had already been married by five husbands and the one she was staying with was not her husband. In Jesus' day, there was bitter hostility between Jews and Samaritan. The reason for the hostility of the Jews to the Samaritans goes back a long way. When the Assyrians took Samaria captive, they deported large numbers of the inhabitants and replaced them by people from all over their empire (2 Kings 17:23-24). These people brought their own gods with them (2 Kings 17:29-31), but they added the worship of [the Lord] to their other practices (2 Kings 17:25, 28, 32-33, 41). In time their polytheism disappeared, and they worshiped [the Lord] alone, though their religion had its peculiarities. For example, they acknowledged as sacred Scripture only the Pentateuch (Genesis through Deuteronomy). They thus cut themselves off from the riches in the Psalms, the Prophets, and other books. Their religion was also marked by a pronounced bitterness toward the Jews. When the Jews returned from exile in Babylon the Samaritans offered to help them rebuild their temple, but the offer was refused (Ezra 4:2-3). This naturally engendered great bitterness. One might have expected that the Jews would have appreciated the fact that the Samaritans worshiped the same God as they did. But it did not work out this way. The Samaritans refused to worship at Jerusalem, preferring their own temple built on Mt. Gerizim c. 400 B.C. When this was burned by the Jews c. 128 B.C. relations between the two groups worsened. To call someone—especially a fellow-Jew—was a great insult. Jesus was called a Samaritan by the Jews (John 8:48).

In summary, the encounter of Jesus and the Samaritan woman is not a random meeting. It was planned by God and depicts Jesus' mercy and love for us. Desperate for a satisfying life and unending grace, the woman at the well is forever changed by Jesus' love for her. It's comforting that Jesus chooses to love the least lovable people, and He chooses to use the least likely characters. When we meet Jesus and are transformed by His love, it's not just something we keep to ourselves. We are forever changed. God bless you.

Feast of Faith Postures of the Mass

In the Mass, we pray not only with our lips, but with our bodies as well. We stand when the ministers enter. In Western culture, standing is a sign of attention, a mark of respect: all stand when the judge enters the courtroom, for example. Standing is also an ancient posture of prayer, mentioned frequently in the Old Testament. When the readings begin, we sit down: a listening posture. Mary sat at Jesus' feet to listen to his teaching; the crowds sat on the hillside or the seashore to hear his words. Kneeling is another posture that is full of meaning. It expresses adoration and worship, but it can also express humility and contrition. We bow: a sign of honor and reverence, acknowledging the presence of God, especially when we receive the Eucharist. And there are other ritual gestures as well—striking the breast, genuflecting, and of course making the sign of the cross. The liturgy invites us to pray with our whole person—with heart and mind, voice and body.



MARCH 14, 2021 — 4RD SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading: 2 Chronicles 36: 14-16, 19-23


The second book of Chronicles is part of a series which traces Jewish history from its beginning down to the end of the exile in Babylon, five centuries before Christ. Today's reading is the conclusion of the book. It summarizes the reasons for the exile and tells how it ended after 70 years. Second Chronicles was placed last in the Jewish bible. When we hear the final words of this reading, we hear how the Jewish Scriptures conclude on a positive note.

Second Reading: Ephesians 2:4-10

Ephesus is located on the western coast of what is today Turkey. The author of this letter to the Christians in Ephesus writes about the saving power of God that is available to both Jews and non-Jews. Today's passage remind us that salvation is God's gift alone. "Gift" is the root meaning of the word "grace."

..#From this weekend on, entrance to Sacristy's bathroom is prohibited.

A Story of Hope From El Salvador, Central America

Some young people in Ahuachapán in eastern El Salvador think that being a farmer is a thing of the past. Their families have farmed for generations, but climate change and soil erosion have caused harvests—and therefore, their incomes—to shrink considerably.

Edwin Carlos, a 17-year-old eager to support his parents and two little brothers, did not see farming in his future. However, after a teacher told him about how new techniques and technology were changing the way farming was being done to help restore the environment, he changed his mind. Edwin Carlos decided to join a group of 220 students who are learning skills like the importance of distancing when plowing and how burning harvest residue can harm the land and air.



Sadly, El Salvador has lost 75% of its rich land because of the large number of trees that have been cut down. "He who knows has an obligation to act," says Edwin Carlos, who now knows how to use water properly so that it is not wasted, and organic manure and other resources to provide nutrients to the soil to produce more and healthier crops.

Total Allegiance

In previous weeks we have seen how the theme of covenant—as a preparation for the baptismal covenant celebrated at Easter—occupies an important place in our cycle of Lenten readings. The notion of covenant as a relationship between two parties carries with it an expectation of mutual accountability and fidelity to the terms of the covenant. When God forged the covenant with the Jewish people on Mt. Sinai, it was a pledge of God's protection, and it would forever permit them familiar access as the Chosen People. For their part, the Jewish people were to observe the dictates of the law, summarized most succinctly here in the form of the Ten Commandments. To be in a covenantal relationship with the Lord God requires an exclusive relationship, just as discipleship with Jesus—ritualized in baptism—demands a total allegiance to him and none other.

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Food for Thought

Prayer and Forgiveness

“Settle with your opponents quickly.” (Matt 5:25)
