From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today's Gospel passage is from the evangelist John. It is from the fifteenth chapter and is part of what we call the "Last Discourse." Time had run out. Our Lord's death was imminent and he now imparted his message to his disciples with a sense of urgency and encouragement. Thus, we hear: "If you keep my commandments, you will remain in my love."

How interesting that our Lord would have us posit love and obedience as something that is connected. Modern hearers are sometimes challenged by the language of obedience. For many, such language is confronting. We bristle at the notion that our self-determination might be threatened, and we can (erroneously) believe that such thinking is an impediment to our human freedom.

There are many threats to human freedom. There are those who live under the rule of oppression. Throughout the world still today, there are people who are deprived of the ability to worship freely.

Some of the most important twentieth century writing about human freedom came from the victims of the Nazi death camps. Read Elie Wiesel's *Night*, Etty Hillesum's *An Interrupted Life*, Dietrich Bonhoeffer's *The Cost of Discipleship* or his *Meditations on the Cross*, or Fr. Alfred Delp's *Prison Writings*. These amazing human beings had very divergent histories. Wiesel was a Romanian Jew. Hillesum lived a privileged life as a Dutch Jew. Bonhoeffer was a German Lutheran minister. Delp was a Roman Catholic and Jesuit priest.

In all of the writings of these individuals, among the many things that one learns is that human freedom is a gift that no shackle, degradation, punishment or torture can thwart. Human freedom is ultimately about personal choice and obedience. In some of his prison writings Fr. Delp stated: "My offense is that I believed in Germany and her eventual emergence from this dark hour of error and distress, that I refused to accept that accumulation of arrogance, pride, and force that is the Nazi way of life, and that I did this as a Christian and a Jesuit." In other words, Fr. Delp's freedom would have been compromised only if he had chosen to accept "the Nazi way of life." Even as he was imprisoned and ultimately, hanged, his human freedom remained intact because he chose to remain obedient to his faith and to his Jesuit community.

Perhaps the reason that we, with our modern sensibilities struggle to appreciate how love and obedience conjoin to pave the way to freedom is because modern logic has now divorced the meaning of freedom from its existential roots. Freedom has become the ability to *have what I want when I want it*, and no longer a way of being that encompasses the totality of who we are.

The Gospel passage ends: "This I command you. Love one another."

Bonhoeffer explained his imprisonment as *The Cost of Discipleship*. Though he was a Nazi prisoner, his obedience to Christ had set him free. Though his life was at stake, he understood better than most that, his life was never at stake. His body may have been forced to acquiesce to a life not of his choosing; his obedience to Christ, however, even as a prisoner of war, allowed his human spirit to soar. Though his life is an example in the extreme, it beautifully illustrates the gift of life and human freedom when love and obedience commingle. By its very nature, it is a life revelatory of Christ himself, in whom we find our ultimate freedom. On a completely unrelated and still, very important subject, I wish to offer my most sincere Mother's Day greetings to all the mothers of the parish. Though it may have started out simply as a secular holiday, it is altogether especially fitting that we remember you and all of our dear mothers with great affection and love. There is nothing like a mother's love! Even after our mothers have been called home to God and we ourselves may be entering the final stages of our lives, the gift of a mother and her love remains a deep and abiding well from which we draw strength, hope, trust and the assurance that we are deeply loved. In so many ways, a mother's love is so very much like God's love for us. For that, all of us, or most of us, have reason to give thanks. Happy Mother's Day!



**MAY 16, 2021 —
THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD**

First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

Today's passage takes us back to the beginning verses of the Acts of the Apostles and sets forth the themes that Luke is going to develop throughout this, the longest book of the New Testament. His major theme is the rule of the Holy Spirit, who enables the apostles to be effective witnesses to Jesus. The Holy Spirit is mentioned 57 times in the Acts of the Apostles.

Second Reading: Ephesians: 4: 1-13

Today's passage from Ephesians was chosen because of its reference to Jesus' ascent to heaven, which is contrasted with his descent to the dead. Early Christians believed that those who died before the coming of Jesus awaited redemption in a shadowy existence described here as the lower regions of the earth. It is our Christian tradition that immediately after his death, Jesus went to these people to announce that they had been saved,

The Parish is Open for Masses

As you know, St. Catherine-St. Lucy has passed certification by the Archdiocese of Chicago to begin offering public Masses on a limited basis. SCSL parishioners are encouraged to update us with your current e-mail in order to receive the weekly notifications of our reopened Sunday Masses and other liturgies as they are scheduled. Each email will contain the link that is needed to sign up in our reservation system on **SignUp-Genius**. **NOTICE: We wanted to let everyone know that if you sign-up for Mass after Friday, they will not be on the sign-up sheets.**

- ..#Please come 15 minutes before mass starts.
- ..#Enter the church by Austin Blvd. only.
- ..#Exit the church by Washington Blvd. only.
- ..#Mandatorily wear a mask.
- ..#Your hands will be sanitized once you enter the church.
- ..#Sign-up at the entrance.
- ..#From this weekend on, entrance to Sacristy's bathroom is prohibited.
- ..#You will be assigned where to sit within the church.
- ..#No congregational singing.
- ..#Avoid touching the pews.
- ..#Follow the signs inside the church.
- ..#Please sit on the pews that are marked.
- ..#No Sign of Peace is permitted.
- ..#You will receive a Worship Aid, which will be discarded after each mass.
- ..#Communion will be received only on your hands.
- ..#After Mass, sanitize your hands.
- ..#You are NOT allowed to gather or stay in church after mass.
