

ASCENSION SUNDAY

From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Ascension of our Lord. "The Church believes that the risen Jesus 'ascended into heaven' in body and soul. In its widest sense, the Ascension includes three moments: the final historical departure of Jesus from his disciples, the metahistorical passage and entry into heaven, and the exaltation, also metahistorical, 'at the right hand of the Father.'" (*New Catholic Encyclopedia*, 1967)

Christians today have a difficult time making sense out of the Ascension of our Lord. We bring our 21st Century minds to a 1st Century statement of faith, and assuming an intellectual superiority, we become dismissive. Are we really so different, however, from Christians of the 1st Century?

Recall that all of the Christian Testament is written as a post-resurrection experience of Jesus. In other words, in light of their experiences of the risen Lord, people began to order their world in a different way. They were compelled to understand the meaning of life in and through the person they came to believe was the Christ. In this newly ordered world, the Hebrew Bible was seen with new eyes. The Old Testament now became something even more important than a record of Yahweh's covenantal relationship with his people. It became a testimony to the truth—a testimony that all of their recorded history pointed to and was fulfilled in Jesus.

Our Christian or *New Testament* is a compilation of post-Easter reflections on the life and ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus. 1 Corinthians 15:3-8 is the earliest record of Jesus' departure from this world found in this New Testament. This earliest account did not address the matter of how Jesus returned to the Father. The *New Catholic Encyclopedia* continues: "The departure of Jesus did not alter essentially the relation of the believer to his Lord. He had been seen, and He would be seen again—soon, they hoped; meanwhile, His invisible presence perdured." (*NCE*, 1967)

As time passed and the parousia (the future return of Jesus at the end of time) no longer seemed imminent, there arose a desire among believers to chronicle the events surrounding Jesus' return to the Father. The author of the Gospel of Luke gathered the historical information available to him (compiled from oral tradition and written accounts—accounts now rife with theological reflection) and recorded the data of the Ascension of our Lord in his Gospel.

As Catholics, we believe that Jesus "ascended into heaven" body and soul. As Catholics who experience his life within us and around us and who one day hope to see him, we are no different than the first Christians. There is no reason to be dismissive. He is with the Father, yet his invisible presence perdures.



**MAY 23, 2021 —
PENTECOST**

First Reading: Acts: 2: 1-11

Pentecost was a Jewish feast that celebrated the beginning of the harvest. It took place 50 days after the feast of Passover. Jewish pilgrims came to Jerusalem from all over the ancient world for the celebration. Today we hear how Pentecost became a Christian feast.

Second Reading: Galatians 5: 1-25

In concluding his letters, St. Paul always had a section instructing his converts about the correct way to live as Christians. Today's passage comes near the end of his letter to the Galatians who lived in what is today central Turkey. Paul offers a sharp contrast between life in the flesh (meaning: life prone to sin) and life in the Spirit.

As you know, St. Catherine-St. Lucy has passed certification by the Archdiocese of Chicago to begin offering public Masses on a limited basis. SCSL parishioners are encouraged to update us with your current e-mail in order to receive the weekly notifications of our reopened Sunday Masses and other liturgies as they are scheduled. Each email will contain the link that is needed to sign up in our reservation system on *SignUp-Genius*. **NOTICE:** We wanted to let everyone know that if you sign-up for Mass after Friday, they will not be on the sign-up sheets.

- ..#Please come 15 minutes before mass starts.
- ..#Enter the church by Austin Blvd. only.
- ..#Exit the church by Washington Blvd. only.
- ..#Mandatorily wear a mask.
- ..#Your hands will be sanitized once you enter the church.
- ..#Sign-up at the entrance.
- ..#From this weekend on, entrance to Sacristy's bathroom is prohibited.
- ..#You will be assigned where to sit within the church.
- ..#No congregational singing.
- ..#Avoid touching the pews.
- ..#Follow the signs inside the church.
- ..#Please sit on the pews that are marked.
- ..#No Sign of Peace is permitted.
- ..#You will receive a Worship Aid, which will be discarded after each mass.
- ..#Communion will be received only on your hands.
- ..#After Mass, sanitize your hands.
- ..#You are NOT allowed to gather or stay in church after mass.
