Dear Parishioners,

Though I have been with you only 4 months, and COVID protocols have hindered my ability to meet many of you, those among you whom I have met have been kind and welcoming. I must admit that this has come as no surprise to me. It is exactly what I expected from a Christian community who worships together, who prays for one another and who welcomes the stranger into their midst.

Admittedly, my assignment among you happened in far from ideal ways and I know how much you have loved and appreciated your pastor, Fr. George Omwando. Equally true, is the fact that Fr. George's re-assignment—during COVID, days before Holy Week and only weeks before Renew My Church would begin—has caused hurt, confusion, mistrust, and concern for the future. None of this was handled well for Fr. George, for you and also for me.

Now, we have begun the final phase of Renew My Church. This initiative has as its goal to make a more vibrant Church of Chicago. Who can argue with wanting a more vibrant Church? The process of developing such vibrancy, however, comes at a cost. The cost is shared by all, but in greater measure by some worshipping communities. This initiative will include some combination of parish closures or parish consolidations. The groupings made up of parishioners from all 4 of the Oak Park parishes now have the task of giving prayerful consideration to what the new Catholic configuration will look like for the Oak Park parishes. At the end of this process, though we cannot know what that new configuration will be, we do know that it will bring change to all of us.

While there are many ways to determine the current vibrancy of a worshipping community, among them, the Archdiocese of Chicago uses 2 particular measures. They are: the size of the weekly worshipping community and its operating budget. The Archdiocese has set the benchmarks at a minimum of 800 people worshipping on a given week-end and the parish having an annual operating budget of \$750,000 or more. What with the changes in mass attendance due to the pandemic, the Archdiocese is using the 2019 worshipping figures, taken from the annual "October count" as the measure.

As you likely know already, St. Catherine/St. Lucy Parish has for many years had Sunday (including Saturday evening) worship figures substantially fewer than 800, and the operating budget is significantly less than \$750,000.

I share this because it is important to be honest and forthright with you. For these reasons, the hard reality is that at the end of the Renew My Church process, St. Catherine/St. Lucy Parish will very likely no longer be a stand-alone parish, though it is premature to know what that change will be. Part of that determination will be with the Renew My Church Grouping members from SCSL Parish and the other 3 Oak Park parishes, along with local clergy and ultimately, Cardinal Blase Cupich.

No doubt, this is very difficult information, perhaps even heartbreaking information to learn. I know that you love your parish and certainly have reason to have great pride in

it. It has a long, rich, and varied history. Now, we embark on developing a new reality. No, it will not be the same as it has always been, but I am convinced that there is reason to have hope in what shall be the future reality. Allow me to explain.

Perhaps the new reality will be that SCSL Parish is combined with one or more of the Oak Park parishes. Perhaps there will continue to be worship services held in SCSL parish church although it has become a part of a new reality. Those are only 2 of the possibilities. I could write a few more sentences that begins with the word "perhaps," but my point is simply that though it will be different, one crucially important component will remain. You are a community of believers who have walked the journey together for many years. Even if that journey begins to include some newcomers, it will remain a journey that all of you may continue to walk together. As finances and resources are combined with other entities, and though accounting practices may change, with whom you worship doesn't have to change. In other words, whatever the new configuration may be, you will always have each other and no change in parish name, no change in worship setting, no change in accounting practices will have any impact on who you are and with whom you choose to worship. Sure, there will be new faces, but you will always have each other.

In the meantime, all parish life takes place as usual through the end of June 2022. It is at that time when changes will begin to be implemented.

As you know, I am also the pastor of St. Edmund Parish. Much of what I write about today is also true for that faith community. There are some differences, but there is no doubt that substantial change will be happening there as well.

Personally, I am a proponent of Renew My Church. Is it a difficult process? Yes. Is it time-consuming? Yes. Do I have some fear and trepidation? Yes. It is nonetheless the right thing to do. It is important that we face current challenges and address the new needs of this time. It will be helpful for our communities to pool our resources (financial, ministry-related, staff-related, priest-related, building-related, et al) in order to build a sustainable Catholic community that will not merely limp along, but will thrive and be an exciting catalyst for evangelization and spiritual growth throughout this new century.




**JULY 4, 2021—  
14TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

**First Reading: Ezekiel 2:2-5**

Our first Scripture reading describes the call of the prophet Ezekiel. He was a Jewish priest who was deported to Babylon at the time of the exile. He is called to proclaim God’s word to those who are exiled with him. God warns him that this will be no easy task.

**Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 12:7-10**

In the passage just preceding today’s reading from Paul’s letter to the Corinthians, he described some of his spiritual visions and revelations. But in today’s passage, he chooses not to boast of these, but rather to talk about how God has worked through him despite his weaknesses.

**Faith & Fellowship**

**“I Feel Free.....”**

When Faith and Fellowship members gather in our Prayer Circle, we begin with a symbol. It might be a photograph of a mountain, a pitcher of cold water, a bowl of fruit, or something else to direct our thoughts to a particular theme, and begin sharing.

Once, we had a helium-filled balloon. The balloon floated all over the room. The leader helped everyone savor the FREEDOM of the balloon, and invited us to talk about where we feel free. One woman said: “I never feel free. I live in a nursing home, I’m not free to come and go, I can’t see my son, I eat and sleep and take medicine when they tell me to....But I feel free when I come here. I can do my art, and do praise dance. I can say what’s on my heart and no one will judge me.”

And Jesus said:

*“The truth will set you free.”*



## ***Re-opening the Parish***

*Though I remain somewhat skeptical that we are prepared to implement fully all of the Phase V guidelines (in that only 41% of the total Illinois population is fully vaccinated, as well as having many immune-compromised and otherwise still vulnerable to COVID-19 worshipers, and of course, our children who are yet to be vaccinated), we can certainly move forward. —Rev. John McGivern, SCSL Administrator*

### **Beginning immediately**

- ..# **Registration is no longer required.**
- ..# **There are no capacity restrictions.**
- ..# **There is no longer any need to do screening for COVID.**
- ..# **Masks will be strongly encouraged for individuals to continue to wear.**
  - ☞ We will have masks and hand sanitizer bottles available at the church entrances.
  - ☞ We will have signs that will state something like “For the safety of everyone, masks are strongly encouraged to be worn while inside church”.
  - ☞ Greeters will NOT sanitize hands upon entering church and before Communion, but we will have containers for self-sanitizing at the Communion station, as well as at church entrances.
  - ☞ In time, there will be changes to the pew arrangements, continuing to offer and encourage a small amount of social distancing.
- **Pews might be re-numbered 1 – 2, or every other pew might be roped off.**
- ..# **Sanitizing church after every function is no longer necessary.**
- ..# **Austin Blvd. and Washington Blvd. entrances may be used for entering and exiting.**
- ..# **At this time, the receptacle for the collection of donations will remain at the front of the pews.**
- ..# **Congregational singing may return though this will inevitably conflict with mask wearing. (We will use hymnals again, and Worship Aids will no longer be printed)**
- ..# **For the time being, we will continue to have the gifts of bread and wine already at the altar and not brought forward by others in the assembly.**
- **For Communion, 2 lines may process forward. There will continue to be no distribution of the consecrated wine.**
