From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

Dear Parishioners:

Statistical analysis estimates that there are currently 7.9 billion people inhabiting our planet earth. 2.382 billion people or 31% of people the world over identify themselves as Christians. One-half of the total Christians in the world, or 1.20 billion people are Roman Catholic. (Interestingly, 56% of the world's Catholics all live in 10 countries, and 40% of the world's Catholics live in Latin America.) 69% of the people in the United States identify themselves as Christian and 23.9% of us are Roman Catholic.

In the state of Illinois, 71% of the population identifies as Christian.: Catholic-28%; Mainline Protestant-20%. 6% of Illinois' population is non-Christian (2%-Jewish; 1%-Muslim). 3% claim to be Atheist. 15% of the Illinois population simply claims no religious affiliation.

In the Archdiocese of Chicago, which covers the areas of Cook and Lake counties, roughly 37% of the population is Roman Catholic. To put it another way, an in comparison to many places in the world and in this country, we live in a relatively easy place to be Catholic. By contrast, southern U.S. cities such as Mobile, AL and Oklahoma City, OK are respectively, only 3 and 4% Catholic. Wherever we live, a Catholic identity is evident in many ways among us. We have a great similarity in our values and ideals. We experience a shared, unifying faith in the Lord Jesus and a rich sacramental life which reveals the Lord Jesus to us, just to name a few.

Nonetheless, you can be sure that Catholics in many southern states have a very different experience of their religious identity. They are a minority. They are misunderstood and in some instances, still today they experience religious bigotry. For those of us who live with the comfort and ease of Catholic life in a northern urban area, I think it is important to ask the questions: How well are we compelled to share Jesus' message of peace? Does our especially large Catholic presence breed renewed desire to share the faith or has it lulled us into a type of Catholic complacency? St. Paul is often called the Apostle to the Gentiles. We are all familiar with his travels far from Jerusalem and his epistles to the people of Corinth, Ephesus, Thessalonica, Galatia, Philippi and Rome. St. Paul's ultimate mission was to let the Gentile people know that Jesus had come to save not only the Jewish people but them too.

It is important to remember that when our Lord Jesus walked this earth, Jerusalem was an occupied territory of Rome. Jesus encountered both Jews and Gentiles and he spoke his message of peace to all who would listen. In the unlikely person of St. Paul, Jesus continued to share his message of peace. St. Paul was faced with a similar challenge as our Lord. Jewish culture was very different than the cultures of the Gentile world. Each did not easily understand or appreciate the others' customs and ways of life. Nevertheless, St. Paul accepted the challenge to bring the peace of Christ to people who were very different from himself, and to populations of people who hadn't ever heard of Jesus. Whether we look on a global scale or scrutinize life right here in our own backyard, we see that our Lord's message of peace yet needs to be preached. Even in the lands our Lord Jesus once walked, there is no real peace. Palestinians and Jews have made no real progress toward acceptance and good will. Civil wars in Central America and Africa continue. Catholics and Protestants in Northern Ireland still struggle to eke out a lasting peace. This list could go on.

Here at home, Caucasian Americans, Latin Americans, African Americans, Native Americans and often Asian Americans continue to live segregated lives. City violence is out of control. Poverty is rampant. There will always be some who are resigned to believe that our cultural, racial, credal and socioeconomic divides are too great. They even lament that "there's nothing we can do." In reality, such resignation is not unlike Pilate's washing his hands of Jesus' fate. Of course, like Pilate, our culpability remains.

St. Paul was a persecutor of Christians until he was blinded and ultimately, transformed by his encounter with Jesus. Though nothing so dramatic is likely to happen to any of us, we, too, have encountered the Lord and are invited to a similar transformation. We, too, are the unlikely ones called to be the prophetic voice of Christ in our time, here at home and abroad, to those similar and dissimilar. Living in the Catholic culture of Chicago can make us too comfortable. Like St. Paul, we must continue to speak Jesus' message of peace to everyone we encounter. Even if we're seemingly preaching to the choir, let the message be heard. Perhaps sometimes, it is precisely to the comfortable and the complacent that our message must be directed. Of course, at all times, let them know that we are Christian, and Catholic, by our love.



First Reading: Jeremiah 23:1-6

The prophet Jeremiah preached some 500 years before Christ, at a time when unworthy kings ruled the Jewish people. He looked to the day when God would raise up a good shepherd from the House of David. Later, the Gospel writers emphasized that Jesus was born of the House of David, and Christians have seen him as the fulfillment of this prophecy.

Second Reading: Ephesians 2:13-18

Our second reading is from the letter to the Ephesians. Ephesus was a community made up of Jewish people had become Christian, and Gentiles who had become Christian. In this part of the letter, the author is addressing Gentiles — people who were once “far off” from the true God, but have “come near”. As a result, both Jews and Gentiles are together as one “new person,” namely the Body of Christ which is the Church.

Re-opening the Parish

- ..# Registration is no longer required.
- ..# There are no capacity restrictions.
- ..# There is no longer any need to do screening for COVID.
- ..# Masks will be strongly encouraged for individuals to continue to wear.
 - È We will have masks and hand sanitizer bottles available at the church entrances.
 - È We will have signs that will state something like "For the safety of everyone, masks are strongly encouraged to be worn while inside church".
 - È Greeters will NOT sanitize hands upon entering church and before Communion, but we will have containers for self-sanitizing at the Communion station, as well as at church entrances.
 - È In time, there will be changes to the pew arrangements, continuing to offer and encourage a small amount of social distancing.
- Pews might be roped off.
- ..# Sanitizing church after every function is no longer necessary.
- ..# Austin Blvd. and Washington Blvd. entrances may be used for entering and exiting.
- ..# At this time, the receptacle for the collection of donations will remain at the front of the pews.
- ..# Congregational singing may return though this will inevitably conflict with mask wearing. (We will use hymnals again, and Worship Aids be printed)
- ..# For the time being, we will continue to have the gifts of bread and wine already at the altar and not brought forward by others in the assembly.
- For Communion, 2 lines may process forward. There will continue to be no distribution of the consecrated wine.
