The Assumption of Mary: A Perspective

As human beings, we are set apart from all other species in the animal kingdom in many ways. We use complex reasoning in ways that other animals do not. We are introspective and are able to describe our thoughts and feelings. We have the use of complex language. We have the ability to posit our very being, and we are curious about the existential questions of life. We have potential. This gift of reasoning allows humanity to transcend the boundaries of our finitude, if only in thought and wonder. That we have faith is indicative of such transcendence.

The goal of every Christian's life is to be completely immersed in the love of God; to be engulfed not by our humanity but by our God, who is Love. We believe that this goal is fulfilled in the next life, when finally we fully transcend this finite world—when we break the ultimate boundary of our earthly existence. We also believe, however, that we can have a foretaste of this ultimacy today.

Mary's "Assumption" is the language we use to explain our belief that she surpassed the boundaries of her earthly existence and attained complete union (body and soul) with our Lord in heaven.

Similarly, Peter, albeit only for a moment, also surpassed the boundaries of his earthly limits when he was able to walk to Jesus on the water. At that incredible moment, Peter, too, was expressing his perfect trust in Jesus, who has made this possible. His own earthly life is a life of profound transcendence. His virgin birth. His self-awareness as God's Son. Every moment of the earthly life of Jesus was one of total immersion in the love of God,

even to the point of his death. His subsequent resurrection opened the way for his mother, Peter and all of humanity to follow.

We, too, have moments of transcendence although they are far more fleeting than even the experience of Peter on the water. Then our rational minds break through and tell us that such isn't possible. We doubt again—humanity engulfs us and we begin to drown.

There is something, however, which keeps bringing us back. We consider the possibilities and, once again, perhaps unknowingly at first, we begin to exceed our own limits, finding ourselves immersed in this limitless, all-pervasive love that is God.

Oh, to be sure, we will falter again, but every faithful attempt has the potential to bring us closer to the goal, to exceed our expectations, to transcend our boundaries, to walk on the water just that much longer. It is a life-long process of learning and faltering and trusting and loving. Mary is our perfect example of what awaits those who love and trust in the Lord. Thus, we celebrate Mary's heavenly countenance, and pray that one day, where she has trod, you and I may follow.

Social Justice Morning of Reflection- **Saturday, August 21** for parishioners of Oak Park parishes to discuss what we are doing and how we might work together.



AUGUST 22, 2021— 21ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



First Reading: Joshua 24:1-2, 15-18

After Moses died, God selected Joshua to lead the Israelites across the Jordan River into the Promised Land. Years later, as his own death approached, Joshua wished to ensure that the people would not forget all that God had done for their ancestors. In today's readings, we will hear Joshua, then the people, renew the covenant made at Mount Sinai.

Second Reading: Ephesians 5:21-32

In the letter to Ephesians, the last part deals with family relationships, and is conditioned by the household structure of the time —wives, children, slaves — with the husband as “patriarch” over all. Today’s excerpt talks about husbands and wives. Later, this letter will talk about the relationships between children and parents, and between slaves and masters. What we learn is not that we should re-create ancient social structures. Rather, we learn the timeless truth that Christ’s love for us should affect the way we love one another.

The Destiny of all Mortal Flesh

The celebration of today's feast on a Sunday is unusual on our Roman Catholic calendar. Our observance of the Lord's Day is held in such high esteem that few other feasts replace it. Occasionally there is a feast—usually of one of the saints—in which the saving power of God in Christ is so uniquely focused that the Roman rite deems it worthy of celebration on the Lord's Day. Today is such a feast. Yet some are surprised at the brevity of the dogma in its entirety: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The Roman Catholic Church never defined any specifics or particulars about the event itself. It is not in the scriptures. There are no verifiable eyewitness accounts. At its core, the dogma reveals in Mary the destiny of all mortal flesh, and reinforces our creedal belief in resurrection of the body. This feast strengthens our faith, defined last week in Hebrews as the realization of things hoped for. We find, in Mary, that realization of what we all hope for, what Paul today affirms: "In Christ shall all be brought to life" (1 Corinthians 15:22).

Food for Thought

A Life Completed—A Gift Received

*The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin signs her life so laudatory.
Mary was taken up body and soul into God's heavenly glory in a singular participation:
Her Son's resurrection story.*

The proclamation of the Assumption is viewed as Churchly oxygen, in expression of full, most meaningful acceptance of the feminine. Thus, ordinary flesh-and-blood people are able to Divine life win.

Mary's Magnificat is non-regal, but in the Churches and in town, they seem not ready to accept the things she implies with an earthly gown. She's like us in simplicity, but shown typically with halo and crown.

The Magnificat shows no pretensions: Mary answers the servant gongs. proclaiming God's special goodness to her. with lyrical piece of faith-filled songs. For all those in awe of God's majesty, He upends nasty worldly wrongs.

The Magnificat is Luke's gift to us; He invites us to contemplate the God of real life that Mary proclaims. Song calls us to open the gate to God in everyday activities; She warns us: keep your goals straight.

As we all celebrate the Assumption, Mary takes salvation wholly, and where we'll find it; we're led to seek God in times and places where lowly are all cherished, and the hungry are fed. We receive and show God's Mercy holy.

*"My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord;
My spirit rejoices in God my savior...
From this day, all generations will call me blessed:
The Almighty has done great things for me,
and Holy is his Name." (Luke 1:46-49)*
