



Thoughts From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

Dear Parishioners,

I have already watched quite a bit of the Olympic Winter Games, and I marvel at how perfectly fit young people effortlessly leap through the air on their skis or skates, and race down the mountainside at speeds that I am sure I would find quite frightening. These are the world's best athletes at the peak of their physical abilities. They are young, strong, energetic, carefree and still at an age when they feel they can accomplish almost anything. In fact, Olympic athletes *have* accomplished most everything about which they have dreamed. All of this and many of them still not even twenty-one years of age.

So many of us love to watch the Olympic Games, I think, because these athletes symbolize the power and beauty of youth. Most of us look fondly on our earlier years. Life was uncomplicated. We ran for the sheer joy of running. We enjoyed life in a free and easy way. It is a wonderful time of life—the time when we begin to set our sights on even greater heights and plan for adult successes. After all, it is what our parents have prepared us for—to be healthy, happy and productive members of society.

As I sit in my office chair, and remember the days when I was a competitive athlete who, like every child, dreamt of one day becoming an Olympian, the here and now comes back to me all too quickly as I feel the ache in both of my knees. (Knee replacements surgeries are coming this summer!) I am suddenly reminded of the reading glasses sitting upon the bridge of my nose which is magnifying these very words I write. You get the picture.

When we are young, we accumulate knowledge, strength, friendships, appetites, abilities... In our adulthood, we accumulate more knowledge, perhaps along with some measure of prestige, responsibility, real estate, cars, and we may also accumulate things, lots of things.

As the sand slowly passes through the hourglass of our lives, we begin to realize that nearly everything is transient. We let go of our youth, our perfect health, our hair, (even our teeth), and many of our loved ones begin to be called home to God. We become more acutely aware that just as we come into this world with nothing, so shall we leave this world in exactly the same way.

This, I think, is part of the process of attaining wisdom and spiritual maturity. By accepting the reality that just as life freely and easily flows, there is a time when life as we knew it also begins to ebb, we may be able to experience peace and serenity with what is. We learn that our real needs are few, but for companionship and love. At the end of our lives, none of it will matter except for the faith that we have lived and the love that we have shared.

For those of you who are young, enjoy this wonderful time of life. For those of us who are at a more nostalgic age, let us not merely lament what once was, but amid our sore knees and weakening eyesight, embrace who we are today, for the inevitable loss that comes our way will only ever weaken our bodies and minds. Perhaps this is the process by which our souls evolve and our spirits learn to leave go of their external shells, all in preparation for the fullness of life with our God of Love, which, finally we understand, is all we ever really and truly desired or needed.



FEBRUARY 20, 2022— 7th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Samuel 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23

In this reading we hear of Sau and David. Saul became the first king of Israel, about 1,000 years before Christ. David, best known for slaying Goliath, was also a talented musician and became one of the favorites at Saul's court. Eventually, the king grew jealous of the popular David who had to flee for his life.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:45-49

Paul's converts at Corinth had a lot of questions about life after death, and on the last two Sundays we've heard Paul addressing these. Today he uses a parallel. Just as we receive our human life from our ancestors — ultimately Adam — so we received risen life from Jesus, who could be called the "new Adam".


