Thoughts From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

Dear Friends,

In recent years, St. Thérèse of Lisieux has lost popularity with Catholics who dismiss her piety as child-like and over-sentimentalized. To be sure, she does write with an exuberance and earnestness that even verges on the uncomfortable. Nonetheless, the example and the instruction of this holy woman of the late nineteenth century has much to offer to us.

St. Thérèse, like her siblings before her (and one after her) became a Carmelite nun. As such, she understood that hers would be a simple life though she longed to please the Lord with great, heroic and saintly deeds. She wrote:

I have always wanted to become a saint. Unfortunately when I have compared myself with the saints, I have always found that there is the same difference between the saints and me as there is between a mountain whose summit is lost in the clouds and a humble grain of sand trodden underfoot by passers-by. Instead of being discouraged, I told myself: God would not make me wish for something impossible and so, in spite of my littleness, I can aim at being a saint. It is impossible for me to grow bigger, so I put up with myself as I am, with all my countless faults. But I will look for some means of going to heaven by a little way which is very short and very straight, a little way that is quite new.

Thus began “the Little Way” of young Thérèse. Undeterred by her inability to witness to her faith in the grand way that she would have loved, she chose this little way to demonstrate her love for God and her fidelity to Christ.

Love proves itself by deeds, so how am I to show my love? Great deeds are forbidden me. The only way I can prove my love is by scattering flowers and these flowers are every little sacrifice, every glance and word, and the doing of the least actions for love.

Thérèse would be especially kind to the sisters in her community that she didn’t like or who were unfriendly to

her. She never complained about the (usually) left-over food that she was given to eat.

Ultimately, Thérèse’s “Little Way” had everything to do with making small daily sacrifices and trusting that they would be pleasing to the Lord Jesus. It was precisely this that made Thérèse so appealing to the people who came to know her through her writings shortly after her death. Catholics were searching for the right road to holiness. Thérèse offered a new, albeit, “little” way.

Every year, the Season of Lent come around and you and I are asked embrace the ancient practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving that these spiritual exercises, if you will, will soften our hardened hearts and reignite within us a burning love for the Lord Jesus.

For some, the Season of Lent can be overwhelming. We want to do it right. We want to make the grand Lenten gesture, or at least, assume that, as with much of life, bigger must always be better. St. Thérèse reminds us that there is another way—a “little way” to Christ Jesus, traveled each and every day by the small sacrifices she made and the humility with which she made them.

In the end, Thérèse made peace with her new approach to her spiritual life. She explained that...

...Charity gave me the key to my vocation. I understood that the Church had a Heart and that this Heart was burning with love. I understood that Love comprised all vocations, that Love was everything, that it embraced all times and places...in a word, that it was eternal! Then in the excess of my delirious joy, I cried out: O Jesus, my Love...my vocation, at last I have found it...My vocation is Love!"

Overly-sentimental piety though it may be, St. Thérèse of Lisieux continues to offer a spiritual roadmap for Catholics who today experience difficulty finding their way to the Father. Maybe they (we) need to forego the journey along the interstate highways and walk the path of the “Little Way,” that led Thérèse of Lisieux to sainthood—to perfect love and joy with her Lord.

Lenten Regulations(from Ash Wednesday, to the
Paschal Triduum)**Fasting and Abstaining
From Meat**

One of our Lenten Practices uniting us with Catholics around the world! Fridays during Lent are days of abstaining from meat. Good Friday is a day of abstaining from meat and fasting.

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent.

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

The special Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.

Ordination Bann

Mr. Kevin Morgan, a parishioner of St. Catherine/St. Lucy Parish, is scheduled to be ordained to the Order of Deacon for the Archdiocese of Chicago on **May 14, 2022**. This is a public announcement of the upcoming ordination and fulfills the canonical requirement.

Catholics are obliged to reveal any concerns, impediments or circumstances that could prevent Mister Morgan from receiving Sacred Orders and should contact the pastor or the Cardinal with such information as soon as possible if there is a serious question about the candidate's suitability for ordained ministry.



THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading: Exodus 1:1-8, 13-15

When he was a young man, Moses had slain an Egyptian official, and he had to flee into the desert near Mount Sinai (*sometimes called Mount Horeb*). In the ensuing years, he settled down, married and worked as a shepherd. Now, probably thinking he had a quiet future, his life takes a different turn.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12

Paul did not want his Corinthian converts to be overconfident. They were saved by their faith in Jesus, but they still needed to live a daily life pleasing to God. (In this passage, we will hear Paul refer to an interesting piece of Jewish folklore not found in the Bible. The legend is that the rock from which God gave them water followed them wherever they went in their desert wanderings.)




FAITH & FELLOWSHIP

Morality and Peace

"Prayer, charity and fasting are principal ways for God to intervene in our lives and in the world."

"They are weapons of the spirit and we implore from God the peace which we are incapable of building by ourselves."
(Cardinal Parolin,
Vatican Sec'y of State)

*"I carry the terror of war inside me."
"My heart and soul are in Ukraine."
"Everything of value to me has faced some kind of destruction."*

On Ash Wednesday, the Vatican asked God to restore peace to our hearts, and to our world.

Pope Francis has spoken of the ambivalence of Catholic moral tradition about war. He prays God will demilitarize the human heart, and said we can't be indifferent; Victims need our sympathy and aid.

We hope strong sanctions, which are economic missiles, might persuade Putin to pull back.

With no moral compass, and trafficking in morally obscene lies to justify his aggression, pull-back is not likely.

The grace and love of the people of the border countries in welcoming the fleeing Ukrainians is pure charity, as is their determination to keep the candle of mercy and hope burning brightly. The Pope praised the Polish people for "opening your borders, your hearts and the doors of your homes." Other countries showing a loving humanity include Romania, Hungary, Slovakia and Monrovia, with shelter and schooling.

The EU, a 27-nation bloc, voted temporary protection.

In the midst of enormous evil, humans always need a savior. We may yearn for peace, and try to build it. But there's evil in this world, and only God's grace can conquer it.

May we all share in his mercy.
