Thoughts From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

Dear Parishioners,

I have some thoughts that I'd like to share. I need to express upfront that you may find them incomplete or grasping after a truth that, ultimately, is beyond my/our ability to comprehend. Stick with me. Though I may get convoluted, I'll do my best to be clear, if not concise. Or you may end up thinking that I've gone off the deep end (and you wouldn't be alone in that assessment either).

I was ordained on May 18, 1991. A week before my ordination, I received my Master of Divinity degree. Most priests receive their M.Div., and some go on to advanced degrees. At the time of my ordination, I had also completed one-half of another degree, the S.T.L, or Licentiate of Sacred Theology. It required an additional year of studies on the seminary campus as well as the acceptance of a published thesis.

My thesis is entitled: "The Primacy of Eschatology in the Suffering God of Jürgen Moltmann." Moltmann is an important Protestant theologian from the prestigious Tübingen School in Germany.

For the purposes of my reflection today, this is not relevant. The notion that God suffers is controversial to many, certainly to Catholics. We believe that God is perfect, and suffering within the very person of God would indicate a lack of perfection. Nonetheless, there was something very persuasive to me in how Moltmann expressed the suffering of God, and it has compelled me to think for myself about the possibility, meaning and/or nature of divine suffering.

While I do not, of course, dispute God's perfection, who could argue that our imperfect or incomplete human understanding and the limits of language thwarts our ability to fully comprehend the totality of who God is.

Every Palm Sunday, we hear one of the Passion Narratives of our Lord, and the Second Reading is always from St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians (2:1-6). It is a beautiful, poetic statement of faith, really, and they are words which have haunted me in a most beautiful way. The passage follows:

*Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God,
did not regard equality with God
something to be grasped.
Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave,
coming in human likeness;
and found human in appearance, he humbled himself,
becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross.
Because of this, God greatly exalted him
and bestowed on him the name that is above every name,
that at the name of Jesus
every knee should bend,*

*of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord,
to the glory of God the Father.*

This notion that God "emptied himself" has always intrigued me. What is self-emptying? I suppose this question could be answered in many ways. Some of the ways that it makes sense to me is that, it is a deliberate hollowing out of oneself. It is a sacrifice of oneself in such a way that that which is removed is given for the edification or benefit of another.

When I try to understand God, the best that I can do is to express that God is Love. In fact, I'd go so far as to express that God is Love Itself, the very ground of Love. If, then, God is Love, then, naturally, God must seek to love and be loved. Therein lies the heart of our notion of a Triune God. Even this trinitarian activity of love, however, could not exhaust the desire for God to love outside of God's self, thus God loved creation into being. Creation, itself, then, is an act of self-emptying, as God must go out of God's self in order to love creation into being.

I have wondered, then, if God cannot help but to Love, and love naturally requires a self-emptying, then can the self-emptying love that is part of the very nature of God, somehow be considered a divine suffering that is innate to Love Itself, to God?

This beautiful passage from St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians has been, in part, the impetus for the most stirring spiritual query that I have ever pondered. As I stated at the outset, it may seem convoluted to some, or simply, "off the deep end" to others, but I cannot seem to shake this notion that somehow, deep in the very being of God, is such a holy ache to share God's very self, that from such a divine desire, all of creation has been born. Moreover, emptying Godself to come "in human likeness," so elevates humanity to such a degree that we may share, become united, become a part of the very life of God.

Whatever language you may put to it, this is what we celebrate this Holy Week. God emptied himself and was born in our likeness. God lived among us and showed us the way to share his life and love forevermore. Not everyone accepted him, and so, God even chose to experience death, that God would experience everything that we experience, thereby allowing us to experience everything that God experiences, which, ultimately leads to resurrection and the eternal activity, the eternal dance of Love that is the very life of Father, Son and Spirit.



EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

First Reading: Acts 10: 34,37-43

The Apostle Peter was originally skeptical about preaching the Gospel to non-Jews. But one day, the Holy Spirit summoned him to preach to a Gentile — the pagan army officer Cornelius and his household. Today's passage is a portion of Peter's sermon, which summarizes the life and ministry of Jesus.

Second Reading: Col. 3:1-4

The letter to the Colossians depicts Christ as the only mediator between God and the world. A previous message of the letter presented baptism as the way we are united with Christ. The author will today remind us of the heights to which Christ has raised us, and then call upon us to live up to this.

Sacrament of Reconciliation



Signs of Lent



Palm Sunday

Today the priest wears red to symbolize God's love and martyrdom and the Christ's suffering and shedding of blood during his Passion and Death. Red is worn again on Good Friday. Red also symbolizes the Fire of the Holy Spirit which is why the priest wears this color in Pentecost again.

The 500 Club Certificates


