Thoughts From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

Dear Parishioners,

Today's Gospel passage recounts the story of Thomas, the one who doubted that Jesus had risen from the dead. To my mind, Thomas was not an unreasonable man. On the contrary, he had come to the same conclusion that any one of us would have come to. The dead are dead. Would not you and I have likewise demanded to see Jesus before we would have believed, and aren't we reasonable people?

Of course, you and I are still asked to believe in this unreasonable resurrection of Jesus, and you and I have not seen him. We have not placed our own fingers into the holes of his nail-driven hands. We have not had our Lord enter our houses or apartments through our locked doors.

Throughout Lent, we listened to many passages from the Gospel; all intended to prepared us for the impending death of our Lord, and the truth of his resurrection which would follow. Whether it was in the Transfiguration of Jesus on the holy mountain, when the three disciples were privileged to witness a foreshadowing of our Lord's glory, or the gardener who begged to cultivate and fertilize his fig tree for one more year, or the mighty story of forgiveness that the father offered to his prodigal son. All of these stories confronted our own understanding of faithfulness, of perseverance, of forgiveness and of love.

Last week, on Easter Sunday, we retold the story of the empty tomb and Mary's worry that the body of Jesus had been taken away. Today Thomas doubts that the resurrected body of Jesus is a reality. Like our Lenten Gospel passages, these resurrection stories also challenge how we believe.

"Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe," said Thomas. Of course, this flies in the face of the whole meaning of faith. Faith is the choice to believe in something when one cannot have certain knowledge. Thomas, like you and me, would love to know for sure. This is not an unreasonable desire.

Jesus responded to Thomas (and likewise, to us): "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Jesus is asking us to abandon our reason, for there is something more even more valuable.

To believe or to have faith is never merely an activity of the mind. It is also a movement of the heart. Those who discovered the empty tomb and today, Thomas who doubted, were challenged to put aside their very rational fears and doubts. Like the characters in the Gospel, you and I are also asked cast aside our rational doubts, and believe. The kind of believing that comes from a place in the heart is precisely what Jesus calls us to. It is not born of what we can see or prove, but of the love that suffers and dies and somehow, beyond explanation, rises again. For is that not the substance of love, of Love (who is God), the transcendent life-giving power which loves us into being, and loves us into life everlasting?





3RD SUNDAY OF EASTER

First Reading: Acts 5:27-32, 40-41

The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of the early Church during the first 30 years after the resurrection of Jesus. It describes God's Spirit at work, directing, encouraging, and supporting the members of the Church.

Second Reading: Revelation 5: 11-14

The book of Revelation was written around 95 A.D. for Christians living in what is today Turkey. The Roman Emperor ordered his subjects to worship him as a god. When the Christians resisted, they were persecuted. The book of Revelation was written to encourage them. Today's passage describes a vision of God's people enjoying heavenly life and singing God's praises for their victory.

FAITH & FELLOWSHIP

I See Jesus.....(Part 2)

A conversation between two parishioners, (not F/F Catechists):

Person #1: Jesus would be in Faith and Fellowship.

Person #2: He is.

Which led the Catechists to consider: I see Jesus in Faith & Fellowship.....

...when we pay attention to each other, which shows we care. We do not ignore anyone.

...when we invite someone to say or do something."

...when I can express the the peace and joy that I have in my heart from knowing that we are all children of God. ...every time we break open the Word of God, every time we have our meal together, every time I see the faces of all gathered.

How Much for the Easter Offering?

What do people give?' A fairly good guidepost is an offering equivalent to what you might put in the collection over the period of a month. So for example, if you usually offer ten dollars each week at Mass, a nice Easter offering is fifty dollars.

Saint Catherine of Siena (1347-1380) - April 29

Imagine the pope receiving a young woman still in her twenties who addresses him as "my sweet Christ on earth," then orders: "Get back to Rome where you belong!" Amazingly, Gregory XI complied! Yet this was but one astonishing incident in the extraordinary life of Catherine of Siena, a truly unique medieval woman.

Youngest of twenty-five children, Catherine refused marriage and became a Dominican Tertiary at sixteen, cloistering herself at home in contemplative prayer, austere penances, and mystical experiences, culminating in "spiritual espousal" to Christ. Then, incarnating the Dominican ideal of "passing on to others the fruits of contemplation," Catherine left her solitude to care for the poor, nurse the sick, comfort the dying, and bury the dead. Increasingly renowned for converting souls and healing bodies, she was sought after to broker peace during civil wars and Church schisms. All this, and like Jesus, whom she called "my Divine Spouse," she died at thirty-three! Four hundred letters and her spiritual classic *The Dialogue* inspired Paul VI to name her, together with Teresa of Ávila, the first women Doctors of the Church.

Jesus faintly said


With mercy and humility:
