Thoughts From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

Throughout this season of Easter, the first reading at Sunday mass has been from the Acts of the Apostles. It is generally understood the Acts of the Apostles was written by the same writer of the Gospel of Luke and it chronicles the inception and development of the early Church.

It was an exciting time. The post-resurrection encounters the apostles experienced with our Lord gave them certain faith that Jesus truly was the fulfillment of all of the Hebrew Scriptures and their Risen Savior. Through their encounters the apostles were filled with hope and joy. They were filled with the Holy Spirit.

The Acts of the Apostles takes us on the journey with the apostles, notably, Paul and Barnabas, who traveled throughout the Middle East to preach the good news of the risen Jesus, to the Jewish people and to the Gentiles. The Jewish and various Gentile cultures were often vastly different. It was a difficult task for these evangelists, however enthusiastic and Spirit-filled they may have been, to share their faith persuasively and in a way which would honor and be respectful to such different ways of life from their own.

Today's passage from Acts points this out: even amid the excitement of the time, there was the confusion and disagreement about how to incorporate Christian belief without disregarding long-held Jewish or Gentile practices. Think about this for a moment. Even at the very inception of our Church, people disagreed! How did they react to their disagreements? People gathered and discussed their confusion and differing perspectives. Among the many principles of Christian living, then, from the very beginning one of them was the importance of respecting differences and having sensitivity to the cultural and religious practices of others. The respect the apostles demonstrated to people different from themselves was important to their ability to evangelize them and to help these new Christians feel welcome and accepted in the Christian Faith. From divergent cultural and religious experiences, the apostles helped to develop a unified Church where people grew to understand how they were connected; how they were one.

I consider this to be an important and hopeful truth for us to recall. We are all aware of the differences among the varieties of Christian believers.

In fact, we need not look beyond our own Catholic Church to experience some challenging differences of opinion.

In this current age, the value to bring together, at times, even wrestle with divergent perspectives seems almost to be anathema. The United States Congress all but refuses to seek points of convergence. Arrogance, self-interest, and an ideological inflexibility seems to have become the norm while the American people continue to suffer under the stifling and self-absorbed rhetoric of a U.S. Legislature constantly at loggerheads.

Even the religious culture among Christians too often seems at an impasse. While I do not condone that we should ever compromise on that which is absolute and unchangeable in our beliefs, I do believe that the fresh and hopeful Spirit-filled air of our earliest evangelists seems to be in short supply.

It is my personal belief that the Church should be the one place where everyone is welcome: the saint and the sinner, the rich and the poor, the young and the old, the healthy and the sick, the black, brown and white, the gay and the straight, the joyful and the despairing, the loved and those who feel unloved. If nowhere else, in the place where we preach that the love of God is love for all, we must find a way to make room for everyone. We may need to stretch the limits of our comfort zone. We may have to risk cracking open the shell to some of our long-held assumptions. We may have to recognize the bias or prejudice that we didn't even know we had. Imagine a parish, a community, a country and a world that strives after this kind of welcoming and acceptance. Imagine the peace, the joy and the hope that would follow! Perhaps this captures something of the Spirit-filled excitement that drove our earliest evangelists to share the Good News of Christ Risen.

Let us look to the apostles of the early Church who came to understand, to appreciate and to accept that "there is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free person, there is not male and female; for [we] are all one in Christ Jesus. (Galatians 3.28). Isn't this the realization of our best selves? Isn't this the life in Christ that ultimately, we all desire?

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Food for Thought

THE ADVOCATE

Theologian Karl Rahner wrote of three moments pivotal to the history of the Church. First, when early Jewish Christianity defined the death and resurrection of Jesus. Second, the Community from Acts 15, Christianity in the Greco-Roman world. Third, transition from 2nd Vatican Council, where the Western Church became a truly world Church.

In the second challenge above, the Christian Jews were concerned other things after circumcision would go, such as the Sabbath, accepted scriptures, and moral traditions. Thus, the difference in followers of Jesus. There was no synodality, but church debates, and finally: "The Holy Spirit and us decided not to place any undue burdens on the Gentile Christians. Jewish law was not essential."

We are called to listen to what the Advocate suggests to us. In any challenge, "we must avoid the risk of giving greater importance to ideas than to reality of the life of faith people live." The core of Christianity was recognized by relationships of love that reflected the Reign of God as preached by Jesus. It's hard for us to grasp the boldness of the decision.

When the seriously-regarded and lovingly-embraced aspects of Jewish Christianity became the blockade to the expansion of Greco-Roman Catholicism, the Holy Spirit led the reflective Jewish Christians to a settlement that saved the Church.

Paul's intense insistence on welcoming the Gentiles was the greatest achievement of his life mission, showing shining awareness of the Advocate's presence and leadership.

The Church exists today as the presence of the Spirit manifested in its local communities and their ministries as the love of God in Jesus. If we feel this mystery in our worship and daily lives, if we feel God's love in us and through us to others, the Easter season has been successful in forming us in the Christian spirit. It's our dynamic life as Church, and then we who participate know the joy of the gospel.



MAY 29, 2022 THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD

First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

Today's passage takes us back to the beginning verses of the Acts of the Apostles and set forth the theme that Luke is going to develop throughout this, the longest book of the New Testament. His major theme is the role of the Holy Spirit, who enables the apostles to be effective witnesses to Jesus. (The Holy Spirit is mentioned 57 times in the Acts of the Apostles.)

Second Reading: Hebrews 9:24-28, 10:19-23

On Yom Kippur, the high priest sacrificed a goat on the altar of the temple. Then he took some of the blood into the holiest place in the temple sanctuary where only he was allowed to go. There, he sprinkled the blood as a renewal of the covenant made at Mount Sinai, and prayed that God would forgive all their sins committed during the previous year. This ritual is the backdrop for today's reading from the letter to the Hebrews.



UNIFICATION UPDATE

As of July 1, Saint Giles and Saint Catherine of Siena-Saint Lucy Parishes will be unified as one. To help us begin BUILDING A NEW REALITY, a UNIFICATION TEAM has been formed. The members are:

ST CATHERINE-ST LUCY:

ST GILES:

The team has gathered twice. At the first meeting, joining them was a representative from the Archdiocese who will be working with them on this new unification phase. He explained that the unification process will take approximately one year and consist of these unification activities:

- Months 1-2: Listening sessions with members of the new parish
- Months 3-5: Naming Team, Liturgical Team, Communication Team
- Months 6-10: Parish Community & Environment Team, Parish Finance Council
- Months 11-12: Transition from Unification phase into Building the New Reality phase.

At this point, there are three areas upon which they will be focusing:

- 1) Listening sessions
- 2) Determining a name for who we are as a new parish
- 3) Unification celebration

The next meeting of the Unification Team will be the morning of June 4th, Pentecost weekend.

Later that day, Fr. Carl will preside at the 5 p.m. liturgy at St. Catherine-St. Lucy. All are welcome to join him at that mass.

Watch for further information regarding Mass and Meet opportunities in the weeks to come. Let's take time to explore Mass and community that brings us together as one.
