

Thoughts From Rev. John W. McGivern, Administrator

This weekend, as we celebrate the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, one of the 20th century's greatest Catholic theologians, a Belgian man named Edward Schillebeeckx, comes to mind. Among the many contributions that Schillebeeckx has made to Catholic theology is his understanding of humanity as being the greatest sacrament of God.

Let's not pass too quickly over that statement, as it is quite a profound one. For those of us old enough to remember the *Baltimore Catechism*, you may recall that question 31 asks: "What is a Sacrament?" The answer to that question, which, I am sure that many of you still remember is: "A Sacrament is an outward sign instituted by Christ to give grace."

Now, let's consider the contribution of Schillebeeckx. In the language of the *Baltimore Catechism*, we might explain, then, that we, human beings, have the most potential to become the greatest sacrament of God because we can become the most visible sign through which Christ can offer his grace.

In the language of today, we might put it this way: humanity can become the greatest sacrament of God in that we have the greatest potential to effect, experience, share and thus, become the real presence of Christ in the world. In fact, that is our Christian mission: we are to be Christ for others and to see Christ in others. We come together at the eucharistic table and worship our God, and in this important ritual, we share a meal which unites us all in the one Body (and Blood) of Christ—in the fullness of Christ truly and really present in the meal. Our communion with Christ at the altar is the source from which we are nourished and sent forth to continue *doing and becoming* what we had just ritually done and become in communion with one another and with the Lord.

Today's Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ holds up the great significance of our Eucharist, but it can only be significant as far as you and I are committed to becoming and being that self-same presence wherever we go and with whomever we meet.

How do we become that self-same presence of Christ? Well, our weekly meal of receiving Jesus in Holy Communion is certainly a necessary nourishing component. There are as many ways to be, see, share, accept and experience the Lord's presence as there are people who attend mass. Let's not overthink it. We must be available to others. We must *share* the gifts of kindness, compassion, understanding, forgiveness, hope and love *with* others. Perhaps more of a challenge for many of us is the fact that we must be humble and open to *accepting* the gifts of kindness, compassion, understanding, forgiveness, hope and love *from* others. Of course, this list is not exhaustive. To put it really simply: we have to show up, we have to love, and we have to allow ourselves to be loved. And we have to let go of the worry that we cannot or will not do it perfectly. Perfection is God's realm. You and me? We simply need to do our best and allow the grace of God to flow through and from us into every other person we meet.

My dear friends, this is the last time that I'll be writing a column for your parish bulletin. In fact, this weekend is the last time that I'll be presiding at Sunday masses. My time in Oak Park is now ending. It has been my privilege and pleasure to be with you these past 16 months. You welcomed me as one among you and for that I am grateful. Your faithfulness, your kindness and generosity have been so very evident, and though you have experienced some challenges as a parish, you have continued to rise above them and be the kind and compassionate people that you are. As the parish now unifies with St. Giles Parish, please be assured of my continued prayers for you. You are in especially capable hands with Fr. Carl Morello as your pastor. He is smart, pastoral, compassionate, a strong leader and quite simply, a holy man.

May our Good Lord bless you today and every day of your lives.

Welcome to Fr. Robert Carlton!

As noted by Fr. Carl in the June 5 bulletin, Fr. Robert Carlton is joining the Oak Park Catholic community as a Pastoral Associate to the newly unified Ascension-St. Edmund Parish and to the newly unified St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy and St. Giles Parish.



Fr. Robert Carlton was ordained in May of 2019 by Cardinal Cupich for the Archdiocese of Chicago. Originally from Evanston, he attended Loyola Academy for high school and then Georgetown University in Washington DC. Following college, he served in the Navy for four years as a surface warfare officer on two ships in Florida where he was also on the US Navy running team. After that, he taught high school English and theology for five years at Fordham Prep in New York, where he was also an assistant coach on the cross country and track teams. He entered Mundelein Seminary for the Chicago Archdiocese in the fall of 2014. In addition to completing the academic program, he coached track and taught religion at Carmel High School, tutored at St. Martin de Porres High School in Waukegan, was a hospital chaplain for a summer at the Children’s Hospital of Los Angeles and completed a summer language immersion at the Working Boys Center in Quito, Ecuador. After ordination, he has served as the associate pastor at St. John Brebeuf in Niles and Immaculate Conception in Chicago and has also worked as the Catholic chaplain at the Metropolitan Correctional Center in Chicago. At IC, Fr. Carlton was a coach for the football, basketball and track teams. Fr. Carlton is an avid runner and cyclist and a reader of biographies. He is very excited about the opportunity to work with and get to know the people at the parishes in Oak Park.

Our liturgical year winds through seasons and feasts, holy days and saints' days and ordinary days, too. All these celebrations are centered on a simple meal of bread and wine. It makes perfect sense that the sacramental action that ritually encompasses our lives as Christians is a meal. Wouldn't it be odd if it were anything else?

Let us not forget today what this meal represents for us as Catholic Christians. By God's design, this sacrament makes real and vital the presence of Christ and the life of Christ in our midst. "When we eat this bread and drink this cup," St. Paul reminds us that Christ' own journey from death into everlasting life becomes ours. What a sign of strength, unity and hope when we gather as a community of faith and partake in this sacred meal!



Happy Father’s Day to the Dads out there! In church, on the golf course, at home. It’s your holiday—enjoy it! Mine can still be a challenge. My dad died many years ago, from a heart attack at age 74. My mom and I were with him as he fought to live. Until the doctors asked us to leave the room. We did. I thought they were going to do a procedure. The door closed behind us. Then we heard his labored breathing, fighting... fighting for precious air. The breathing stopped. The door opened, and we entered. He was gone. No goodbye. No held hand. We left him when he most needed us. I long ago forgave the doctors. I also forgave my mom for leaving him. But I still can’t forgive myself.
