

Pray for the Dead

Fr. Carl's Corner



WELCOME ALL! Whether you have returned to church on a regular basis or just joining us today for Pack the Pews or simply decided today is the day I want to be back in church, WECOME! I am glad you are here.

In a recent study shared by the Archdiocese of Chicago regarding parishioners returning to Mass after the pandemic, the numbers are about 50% for most parishes. In Latino and Polish parishes that number is much higher. Two main reasons why many have not returned since the COVID virus are fear of being in larger crowds and then complacency! Many just fell out of the habit and now enjoy Mass and coffee on zoom!

Once again, let me say how happy I am that YOU have chosen to be with us at Mass in person. I encourage others to also consider it time to once again make Mass a priority. If a Saturday evening or Sunday morning Mass still feels too crowded for you, come during the week when there

are fewer people. You can still experience a sacred time and space and receive Jesus in the gift of the Eucharist.

Eucharist, for us as Catholics, is at the center of our spiritual lives and worship. We believe in the REAL PRESENCE of Jesus who comes to us in the Eucharist we receive and who then feeds and strengthens us to be his very presence to the world in how we choose to live and act. Nothing replaces the feeling of in-person Mass as a community of faith walking together on this journey. In the scriptures readings we hear, in the songs we sing, and in the prayers we say, we are encouraged that Jesus will be strength for the journey, whatever may happen along the way.

If you or someone you know needs a nudge back... here are some reasons for you to do so. (Please share this with one other person who needs a gentle nudge.)

- When we come to Mass, we are physically in the presence of Jesus. "My flesh is real food, and my blood is drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I in them." (John 6:48-58) This makes being here at church different than being anywhere else.
- Remember the spirit works quietly on our hearts filling us with inner strength and peace.
- In being together at Mass we see that the communion of saints, part of our Catholic tradition, is made up of
 real people. We are never closer to those who have died and gone before us than when we are at Mass,
 which is for us the foretaste of the heavenly banquet.
- The Mass gives our lives meaning and direction; we are not only of this world but have a heavenly home to come.
- Going to Mass is a wonderful model of faith, a trust in God who blesses us with life and many good gifts.
 What a message to instill in our loved ones.
- Finally, remember that God never forces God's self on anyone. God merely invites. Attending Mass shows
 we have accepted the invitation to have God as part of our lives and can receive food and strength for the
 journey.

I hope this gives you some things to think about and continued motivation for making time to be at Mass. And remember, if someone you know might need a little reminder why coming back to Mass is important, send this to them and say Father Carl asked me to do so! As a point of information, pre-Covid, we would have around 1,100 attendees at Mass each weekend during the October Archdiocesan count. Since Covid and church being fully reopened, our highest attendance has been 471 FOR A WEEKEND! Let's get out there and encourage and invite family and friends to join us again in person at Mass.

Finally, the Presbyteral Council meets with the Cardinal on November 4. I expect our new parish name will be considered at that time. I will keep you posted.

Thanks to all who shared gently used coats and winter accessories at our CCW Coat Drive this past weekend.

A number of folks have been asking about the return of a Sunday evening Mass here. I have had many conversations with Father Rex at the unified Ascension and Edmund Parish about sharing a Sunday evening Mass at St. Edmund Church which is in the center of downtown Oak Park. This is being looked at carefully and considered for some time after the first of the year. The organization and details need to be worked out and more will be shared regarding this as it develops.

Second Collection next weekend, November 5-6

October 18, 2022

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The sudden and unexpected influx of men, women and children seeking asylum to U.S cities, including Chicago, over recent weeks has presented our community with significant challenges but also significant opportunities to share God's message of compassion and joy. The plight of these asylum seekers, most of whom are fleeing violence, political oppression and crushing poverty in their home countries causes us grave concern, but I am convinced that this is a moment for us to join together in a mission of love and mercy.

Over 3,000 asylum seekers arrived in our city as of mid-October. Almost all the migrants we have welcomed report that they plan to stay in the Chicago area and will need support to reestablish their lives. Unlike other migrants, most do not have relatives in the States with whom they can live and learn as they build new lives.

The Catholic community has shown an outpouring of compassion as churches, religious congregations, and other ministries have opened their doors, and Catholic Charities has deployed a team to connect people with loved ones and conduct initial needs assessments. Across the Church, many parishes have responded, and more help is needed. We have mobilized to create a coordinated Catholic response to assist asylum seekers so we might maximize the impact of our assistance as we bear witness to our faith. A Working Group has gathered to evaluate opportunities to serve. We are considering several options including transitional shelter, parish sponsorships, and pastoral care for asylum seekers.

In support of these efforts, parishes throughout the Archdiocese will hold a second collection for asylum seekers at all Masses celebrated the weekend of November 5-6. The commitment of faithful Catholics like you will help ensure the success of this mission. Please consider giving to this collection or giving directly to Catholic Charities which will serve as a central gathering point for donations. Religious Education Reflections

October has been a busy month in Middle School Ministry. The 7th and 8th grade students began by learning about the Bible, reading selected verses and considering what they might mean for their life.

This is how some of the students responded following the class:

- I learned how to understand Bible verses and what they meant to me
- I learned the book of the Bible is the book of Faith
- I was surprised that I could really relate the verses to my life.
- The fact that there are so many different topics in the Bible surprised me.
- I will remember that God forgives all.
- I will remember how to navigate the Bible.
- I will remember that God is always with me and will always help me.
- I will remember that there is meaning behind the scriptures.

The following session the focus was Salvation History. Our understanding is that this first



began when earth was formed (about five billion years ago). The students considered the vastness and unity of God's Creation. Then they wrote a timeline of their own life, marking the important moments. They shared these at their table and talked about where God was in each of these.

Additionally, some middle school students attended Holy Fire, a Youth Rally sponsored by the Archdiocese of Chicago, on October 15, held at the Credit One Arena at the University of Illinois. There was live music, an optical illusionist, talks, Eucharistic Adoration, and Mass with Cardinal Cupich. Several of our students were chosen to go on stage at various times throughout the day. SPRED(Special Religious Development) is a ministry of the Archdiocese of Chicago whose purpose is two-fold: the inclusion of the developmentally disabled into the



liturgical and community faith life of the parish and the formation of a small faith community where both special friends and their catechists nurture their faith.

The Oak Park area needs more SPRED communities! In order to provide opportunities for special needs children, young people, and adults, we need adults willing to be catechists.

"I have been a catechist in the SPRED program at St. Giles since 2013, when the program began. Since that time, I have come to know and love our special friends, their families and the other catechists in our program. We share our faith with each other through activities, songs and, of course, prayer. I must admit I have learned so much more from our friends than I have taught them, and I am honored to be a member of this wonderful community." --Kathy Ritten



Intercultural Immigrant Ministry – a joint ministry of the Catholic Parishes of Oak Park.

The Romero Mora family are now settled into their new apartment in Oak Park and the children have started school at William Beye School and OPRF High School. This week they were welcomed at the Family Mass by Father Carl and were able to meet many of those attending.

Because they will not receive their work documents until six months after they file their asylum application, there is the need for ongoing support for them. We could particularly use gift cards at Jewel or Walmart. Please drop them off at the St. Giles Parish Center or in the donation baskets at Mass, in an envelope indicating that they are for the migrant family.

There has now been a fund started at our parish. Please make out a check to St. Giles Parish and note that it is for the St. Giles Refugee Fund in the memo line.

Volunteers are needed to help the family settle into our community, especially those with any Spanish speaking skills. If you are interested in helping them adjust, please email us at

Other needs are always emerging, and the flow of migrants from the border into the city of Chicago is ever increasing. If you are interested in other ways of helping, please contact us at the above email addresses.

Over the summer the Prayer Shawl Ministry has continued to provide prayer shawls and lap blankets where needed, 15 in the last month, we received 12 new ones. This past month, we have sent a crate of scarves and hats to the French Nuns in Chicago for the homeless and another to the students at St. Eulalia's School in Maywood. We are preparing a crate



of items to go to the Columban Mission in El Paso, Texas. They tell us that November is their coldest month. Now the Prayer Shawl Ministers are preparing hats and scarves to accompany the coats that were collected for the parish Coat Drive program. A new effort this year are small knitted/crocheted hearts to be presented on Veterans Day to the residents at Hines VA Center.

All of this is because of your generosity. We thank you!

Our Ministry is growing, we welcomed several new members over the summer. We have also been contacted by a group of knitters/crocheters in California who want to start a Prayer Shawl Ministry.

To receive a shawl or lap blanket for a loved one or to have one sent, call the Parish Center office at 708-383-3430, or come by during business hours. Please continue to pray for all those receiving an item. All items are lovingly made and intended to provide warmth and embrace the recipient through the prayers of a loving St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy and St. Giles Parish and the presence of a loving God.


Spiritual Classics for November: Rediscovering the Saints

The Heart behind Serving

The benefits of volunteering at church mean a person no longer needs to search for the blessings that flow from Jesus to us. Generosity fills all the hearts...a majestic plus!
