Fr. Carl's Corner



Joyful, soulful, prayerful, colorful and beautiful would be some of the words that described the celebration of Mass at our St. Catherine-St. Lucy Church site last Sunday as we kicked off African American Heritage Month. Members of our many choirs came together and provided the music for our liturgy which was then followed by a wonderful potluck brunch where folks could mix and mingle over some tasty dishes.

In my homily, I spoke about the many challenges that family life must face today including the family of humanity and our family community as church. One of the pressing concerns is a lack of leadership in our common, societal life. Be it politics, business, education, or health care, we seem to have a lack of credible leaders. Many who offer to serve as leaders either lack the necessary skills or come with an agenda that doesn't make sense or threatens to divide rather than unite.

It's easy to become frustrated and angry. I focused on our need to go inside ourselves and find the courage to take Jesus' call to action to heart. That call, clear in last week's scriptures, was to be salt of the earth and light to the world.

To that end, we all need to think about one life-changing attitude or action we can take to be the salt and light that brings unity and peace to our small corners of the world. Imagine the difference we can make if we all try harder to lift up the values Jesus teaches: kindness, tolerance, acceptance, listening more to understand.

As we work toward unification and *building a new reality* together, I share this thought that I closed my homily with. Greg Boyle, founder of Homeboy Industries, talks about the power of extravagant tenderness in one of his books. He wrote, "Authentic Christianity never circles the wagons, it always widens the circle!"

A heartfelt thank you to all who helped plan the liturgy, advertised our gathering, provided music and song, served, ushered and set-up the gym and brought or donated food for our shared meal. What a beautiful, united effort and a reminder of what can be accomplished when we work together.

This weekend is the Annual Catholic Appeal. I never do a hard push on this with an in-pew solicitation since most of us receive the information in the mail and send it in. Just a reminder if you are doing so, **mark our parish name on the corresponding line so we do receive the credit.**

The Appeal offers us the opportunity to recall how the Lord is with us on our faith journey in good times as well as in the challenges we face to care for and support each other, especially those in most need. Let's keep in mind that a portion of our contributions will go to help Catholic Relief Services. Aware of the recent earthquakes and the suffering in many places where Catholic Relief Services are called upon to assist those in need, I urge you, please, to be generous in this year's appeal.

Today, our readings remind us to keep the commandments of God. If the law of the Lord is written in our hearts, we will act with honesty, mercy and love toward one another. This is a sure way to build unity and live in peace ... most of all to have peace within.

Have a blessed and safe week ahead.



Last week we found out that he had moved to a facility in Cicero: but when a Catechist went to pick him up for the African-American Heritage Celebration, he was told that Keith had been hospitalized - yet again.

Lifelong Learning

In the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd atriums, January brought the end of the Christmas Season and the beginning of Ordinary Time. This was observed in Level 1 by the changing of the prayer table cloth from white to green. The children pondered one last infancy narrative, *The Adoration of the Magi*. The atrium environment was beautified with the addition of *Flower Arranging* to practical life work. And *The Parable of the Hidden Treasure* was also presented.

The Level 2 children reflected on *The Adoration of the Shepherds*, and how these humble people responded to the angel's proclamation of the Good News of the birth of Jesus. The responses of Simeon and Anna when they saw the baby Jesus after a lifetime of waiting were pondered in *The Presentation in the Temple*. The month ended with the parable of *The Precious Pearl*, which Jesus compared to the Kingdom of Heaven.



In the first session of Level 3 the children were presented *The Structure of the Mass*, and discussed how it is one great prayer divided into two parts – with each part made up of many prayers. The second session looked at *The Memorial*, the moment in the Mass when we remember the Last Supper and Jesus saying, "Take and eat..., take and drink..., do this in memory of me," and how that act of memory carries forward in time and place. These presentations culminated with the celebration



of Mass with Fr. Carl in McDonough Hall. This special Mass lifted up the presentations that the children have seen in the atrium, and provided points of reference to tie the children's experiences in the atrium to the celebration of the Mass. The children enjoyed taking key roles in the liturgy.

Being a true Gospel neighbor

One day, when some people wanted a description of the boundaries of their responsibility, they asked Jesus "Who is our neighbor?" Jesus replied with the parable of the Good Samaritan, who helps the injured man at the side of the road when others passed him by. Then he turned the question inside out: "Who was the neighbor to the man who needed help?" Many of our parishioners have responded to this question by being a true neighbor to those in need.

When there was an opportunity to help create the temporary winter shelter at the former rectory of St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy, Jack Crowe was one of those who



became a neighbor to those in need. As a former lawyer, he brought an understanding of contractual issues that needed to be addressed as our parish collaborated with Housing Forward and the Village of Oak Park. He could also draw on his experience in the startup up of several Catholic educational programs, including Cristo Rey Jesuit High School, Christ the King Jesuit College Prep, Cristo Rey Network, and working at Year Up, a program to give young adults meaningful work experience.



Jack minimizes his own role in the shelter project. "My goal is to leave every meeting with nothing on my to do list," he jokes. Still, his ability to bring people together around a vision, gain agreement on a strategic plan, and identify the necessary tactics helped move the project forward.



Jack is quick to praise Fr. Carl and Lynda Schueler of Housing Forward for their leadership and the Oak Park Village for their financial support. Matt Brophy, Dan Doody, and Jim Jankowski brought together the resources and labor to make essential renovations to the building. As a result, staff and volunteers are welcoming up to 15 people each evening, providing a warm, safe environment and an evening meal and breakfast.

Jack is a third generation Oak Parker. His grandparents attended St. Catherine of Siena Church and later St. Giles. His dad attended St. Catherine elementary school, and his father's name appears on a plaque honoring parishioners who served in WWII.

Jack and his wife Ave Zuccarino got married in St. Catherine Church in 1989. Later, Ave and Jack joined the Family Mass Community at St. Giles parish. The whole family has participated in the Appalachian Service Project. "We believe we are here to help those in need, to be loving, to be servants," he said.

After a health crisis two years ago, Jack stopped working, which "freed up some time," he said, laughing. As he has gotten older, he has felt called to "the more contemplative side of life, to be a more loving person," he said. "This leads to caring for our sisters and brothers. It's not a single event; it's a process."

Jack sees the unification of parishes and the Austin Boulevard location as "an opportunity to co-minister together, enriching Oak Parkers with the diversity and talent on the West Side."

Parish Life

Food For Thought Freedom to Live in Love

"Blessed are they whose way is blameless, who walk in the law of the Lord. Blessed are they who observe his decrees, who seek him with all their heart." (Psalm 119:1-2)

We read this Sunday of fidelity and freedom.

How much freedom do we have? In Sirach, worthiness is wisdom: "Choose the commandments. If you trust in God, and keep the candle of compassion burning, You too shall find the Light. Stretch forth your hand; Before man are good and evil, sun and darkness.

The Psalm promotes opening our eyes to the ways of wisdom and wonder. Paul feels even with wisdom, animated by the Spirit, people in their hearts cannot comprehend God's works. Matt's gospel is a revelation of Jesus' wisdom and integrity, speaking in support of the law: "I have come not to abolish the law, but to fulfill." (Matt 5:17)

Jesus' call to clarify
what had gone before,
focused on God's love of humanity.
He preached radical nonviolence;
