Fr. Carl's Corner

Dear Parishioners,

Our Renew My Church journey continues. This week, Rick Moreno introduced the next phase of Renew My Church (RMC), *Building A New Reality*, to the two parishes' Unification Teams and pastors, following the same introduction to the parish staffs the previous week. *Building A New Reality* is the third phase of Renew My Church, and is dedicated to Mission and Evangelization; the Mission that Christ entrusted to the disciples, and in turn to all of us. How appropriate it is that we begin this work at the same time we begin our Lenten journey. Rick reminded us at both gatherings what a unique community we are when he highlighted the exciting possibilities from several sections of the Cardinal's Decree:

- Based on the hopes and commitment expressed by the Oak Park grouping during the discernment process, the archdiocese affirms the grouping's vision to use <u>St. Catherine-St. Lucy campus as a base for powerful ministry outreach to the West Side of Chicago.</u> <u>Ministry outreach efforts will be supported by the entire Oak Park</u> <u>Catholic community.</u>
- Being structured as two parishes does not preclude efforts to work as a united Oak Park Catholic community. To best serve the areas of Oak Park, Austin and Galewood with two parishes, the archdiocese encourages parish leaders to continue to share ministries.
- The archdiocesan RMC Commission encourages the Oak Park Catholic community to collaborate with the West Side Catholic community to envision how best to collectively address the spiritual and social needs of their shared ministry areas. This includes using the resources of both communities as well as their physical presence at St. Catherine-St. Lucy, St. Martin de Porres, St. Agatha, St. Angela School and other Catholic institutions serving the community.

The decree announcement concluded that "The renewal process calls us to <u>become a stronger, more sustainable</u> <u>presence for the future, capable of reaching more people</u> in their work of making disciples of Jesus Christ, building communities with one another and inspiring witness in the world around us." "The newly united parish communities will embark upon the next phase of renewal, focusing on strong evangelization to the world around us. We know that this structural change is just the beginning of our journey of renewal. <u>"Renewal of our Church means that every Catholic,</u> <u>every searcher, and everyone who loves Jesus and his Church, will have to look anew at what it means to be</u> <u>Jesus' disciple and to live out that discipleship."</u>

We can all be proud of the opening of the temporary shelter at the St. Catherine-St. Lucy site. The work underway to bring together our Religious Education Programs, the creation of a formation center, and our 5:00 PM Sunday Mass with a focus on young adults are just some of the ways we, the Catholic community of Oak Park, are increasing the joy of renewal we expressed and that was entrusted back to us from the Discernment and Decision phase.

The call entrusted to us by the RMC Commission and Cardinal Cupich as highlighted above is exciting and challenging. It is important to remember to remain focused on the mission to create a solid structural foundation necessary to build a new reality focused on evangelization, missionary discipleship, and creating a sense of unity in the larger Catholic community of Oak Park.

We continue to ask for your patience, faith and prayers as we embark upon this continued journey together. The heart of this journey encourages us all to remember that it is Christ who we follow. He promises to strengthen us in the gift of the Eucharist, wherever we share in that scared meal. We are called to imitate God in our actions, especially in how we live with, and among, each other as communities of faith, hope and love. Let's not lose sight of this as we continue to face the challenges before us as we also look forward to many wonderful opportunities.

Lifelong Formation

Religious Education Reflections

On Sunday, February 12, families met for religious education and discussed the sacraments. Families talked about the gifts they bring to the world, and from there touched on the sacraments of Marriage and Holy Orders. When the parents talked separately, they focused in on those two sacraments and considered their meaning in the context of their lives.

With the 1st through 3rd grade students, we started off listing the seven sacraments and talking a little bit about each one, just continuing on what the previous child started. Some of the kids shared that they had been to a baptism or a confirmation. We talked about first communion and all the rest of the sacraments. Then we did a puzzle that showed what the names of the sacraments were, and what God gives us in each sacrament. After that, we played a sacrament game where the kids had to decide which sacrament was being described and then put it in a category, talking a lot about each sacrament as we did that. Then we moved onto sacrament bingo. The children really liked that one! They're a fantastic group. They love to share; they listen to each other and build on what another one says. This time we did a lot of work at tables, kind of like small groups, and they did really well with that.

The 4th and 5th graders had a very full discussion!! They began their class by playing a game of "This or That" to review the concepts of Lent as well as to get inspired for the upcoming Lenten Season. They continued their discussion exploring what it means to make a sacrifice and how that feels. The 4th and 5th graders also took time to reflect on personal behaviors they could pay better attention to and improve upon during Lent. They each made two messages for themselves on post-it notes to be placed in a place they will see each morning as a reminder. One message is for the sacrifice they will practice during Lent and the other is the behavior they wish to improve. The sacrament of Reconciliation was also tied to this discussion, including its value during the Lenten Season. We translated and discussed the Ten Commandments exploring how they act as a guide for us in being our best selves. We ran out of time, but look forward to making our own Ten Commandment tablets the next time we are together, as well as learning all about Holy Week and Easter!

The 6th grade students remembered how the sacraments are a source of grace to lead a Christian life and how we are called, among others, to be prophets through baptism. We identified the prophetic books in the Bible, and after reading Matthew 13:53-58, the question, "what is a prophet, and what does a prophet do?" was open for discussion. We also identified three steps a prophet follows to bring a call to conversion: a) denouncing what is wrong, b) renouncing to take part in it, and c) announcing a path of hope that will deliver us from what is wrong/evil. Based on these reflections, they identified Malala Yousafzai and Greta Thunberg as people that today are fulfilling the call to be prophets and acknowledge that even though there are people like these two brave young women, all of us can change, work on our conversion and positively have an impact our surroundings by saying like Isaiah: "Send me Lord, here I am." (6:1-8)

<u> Pray For Keith – Part 2</u>

"Keith" was discharged from the hospital after a few days, and returned to the nursing home where he had been. Everyone was happy that he wasn't bounced around to yet another facility, and especially that he is close enough to be able to be part of the Wednesday Night Group again. We were surprised, though, to see him in a wheel chair and wearing a Velcro leg brace, and worried that it would prevent him from getting into the driver's car, and managing the steps at Faith & Fellowship. But it turned out that he did not need the chair and could hobble up and down the stairs... and that all the troubles of the past months had done nothing to squelch his happy positivity. He was overjoyed to return – we were overjoyed to have him back – and everyone knew that prayers *had* been heard!!!

Signs of Lent

Each week we are highlighting a different sign of the Lenten Season. This week: "Why don't we sing *The Gloria* or *Alleluia* during Lent?"

The Gloria is a song of exaltation and joy, while the *Alleluia* is the highest form of praise. Lent, in contrast, is a penitential season. *"Alleluia"* is not said at Mass during Lent, either during the gospel acclamation or in hymns. We "fast" from *Alleluia* as a reminder that we are on a journey towards Easter – when we will break forth our greatest praise!

Lifelong Learning

Center for lifelong learning and faith formation Town Hall Summary

On January 26, a town-hall style meeting was held to discuss the possibilities of a center for lifelong learning and faith formation. More than 30 people attended and participated in the conversation. The evening began with prayer and brief history of the origins of this center. The planning teams were also introduced. Participants then divided into small groups, each with a facilitator who took notes. The evening ended with a large group forum for people to ask questions and express their feelings.

The following is a summary of the responses to the small group discussion questions:

What is something faith related that you would invite your neighbor to?

While there was a variety of specific events, the responses fell into six main categories

Prayer and liturgical gatherings Service and Justice events Speakers, presentations, retreats, and workshops Small group gatherings centered on a topic Celebrations and festivities Social events and potlucks

Have you had a significant experience that made your faith come alive?

The responses to this question were personal and thoughtful. Some people talked about the significant impact of retreats, pilgrimages, special masses, and other prayer experiences on their faith life. Others shared that life events, like having a child or losing a loved one, connected them deeply to their faith. Still others reflected that there wasn't one specific moment but it is a lifetime being in a faith community and walking with God that has made all the difference.

After hearing the introductory remarks, what did you feel?

Some participants were excited that the process is open to the movement of the Spirit. The whole community has so much to offer. They feel this work is really important and desirable. They liked the idea of sharing resources and expressed that vibrant and different programs are needed. A couple expressed the hope to feel more personal attention and saw that there is more work that needs to be done in building bridges between the parishes as well as within the parish. Other participants didn't have a good understanding of the endeavor and were not trusting of it. They were worried about the possible location of the center. Others were clear in their desire to see a level of transparency in this process and in the progress along the way.

What do you see as a potential for this center?

The following are a summary of the ideas that surfaced: Social justice Pair up teens with the elderly for community Build relationship and providing meals Focus on evangelization – evangelization to our own families and to the wider community. A spiritual home for people in new high rises Offer spirituality, scripture, speakers Small group learning, centering prayer, learn from each other Ecumenical outreach in LOVE, ACCEPTANCE, DIVERSITY – learning and understanding about others.

There were a few lingering questions: Where will we find the space? What is the timing on the Center? What are the potential costs and financial needs for this center?

Feasibility Study Underway

As part of the **Renew My Church** initiative for the Oak Park Catholic community, a team of volunteers from the parishes of St. Catherine–St. Lucy and St. Giles and Ascension and St. Edmund has begun a feasibility study for transforming the St. Catherine-St. Lucy rectory into a social services community center that serves families of students at St. Catherine–St. Lucy School and other West Side schools.

St. Catherine-St. Lucy already hosts three social service organizations: part of the rectory is now a temporary emergency shelter operated by **Housing Forward**; the convent houses a residential program for women overcoming addiction run by **Sister House**; and **Beyond Hunger** has a cold storage facility in the garage of the rectory. The study group is divided into three committees: surveying the needs of West Side families and creating a business plan; completing a facility needs assessment of the rectory and convent; and developing a fundraising plan to generate the resources to launch and sustain the new project. Food For Thought Called to a Holy Life

"Our soul waits for the Lord, who is our help and our shield. May your kindness, O Lord, be upon us who have put our hope in you." (Psalm 33:22)

"Who do you say that I am?" The interaction that followed ended with Jesus telling his disciples his vocation would include suffering. Following the hard teaching, he gave three disciples a glimpse of the future of all creation in the Transfiguration. Jesus, fully human, was permeated with divine splendor, overwhelming the disciples who had so easily proclaimed that Jesus was the Son of God. They could not comprehend the sheer stunning majesty that they had seen.

The blinding brilliance of the mountain experience for Peter, James and John must have been the high point of their dedicated discipleship. They could never adequately describe the extraordinary experience. The same is true for us-there are moments in our deepest relationships when we feel the glowing warmth of love and special closeness, when we glimpse the depth of another, in ways that defy description. We realize the truth of love is timeless, deeper and broader than imaginable: A transformative experience.

In the glory and mystery of the Transfiguration, Jesus is self-revealed as God's beloved. We are offered more than just a glimpse of his divine calling. His appearance as the Son of God, in his revelation of divinity, gives us a preview of our own destiny, reminding us of the truth of Genesis' teaching: Humans are oriented to become ever greater images of God. Paul tells Timothy how God saves us through what happens to us when we love.

Transfiguration is the destiny we all share with Christ, if we allow ourselves to be loved like him, and called to a Holy Life.
