

## Fr. Carl's Corner

Dear Parishioners,

It will be ten years since the election of Pope Francis as bishop of Rome. As you know, He is the first Roman Pontiff from Latin America. One of the themes that has come from his papacy is a desire for a church that is mission focused at every level. Francis insists that the nature of the church is missionary, always seeking new ways to proclaim the gospel. As we look back at the words of this new pope as he first addressed the crowd in St. Peter's Square, he talked of journeying together. This is also at the heart of Francis's desire for synodality, which means the bishop and his people take up the journey together as we look at the many needs and challenges of our church and the people for whom it serves.

It is, the pope said, "a journey of fraternity, of love, of trust among us."

So what does this have to do with us, you may be asking? This same message applies to us in our small corner of our world: the church here in Oak Park and the people both here and beyond our geographical borders who are part of our communities. The words of Pope Francis from the time of his election as Pope remind us that "renewal" is the foundation of our church, and for each of us individually, all the way to the resurrection of Christ! As we journey through Lent, the suffering of Our Savior, his death, and his rising in many ways parallels our own journey in faith. This is true for us as a community as we have worked through Renew My Church and now move forward into Building a New Reality. We are called to embrace the mission left to us by Jesus: "Spread the Good News." The call to renewal is real and this is our time to pay attention and to act.

From the beginning of Renew My Church and the initial leadership groups from each parish that met together, this desire was made clear: "To become a stronger, more sustainable presence for the future, capable of reaching more people." We share this information as a reminder that we can be proud of this desire and the work being done to reach this expressed goal of renewal in this current moment.

Our efforts to unite our Religious Education programs to give our families more options and to engage the talents and faith of our community is a work in progress. Also, the creation of an Oak Park Catholic Formation Center for all points to creative ways of renewal, mission and making disciples for Christ. This weekend, and in the weeks to come, you will hear more information as our plans continue to develop. Since these are our collective efforts as the larger community, we wanted to share this in our respective bulletins at the same time.

Staying focused on the present and the future of our faith, and increasing the joy of renewal desired by all of us is happening through all our efforts. Your prayers and support are needed. We recognize change is never easy and there will be challenges. As we, the Body of Christ, continue to transform the challenges of structural renewal from maintenance to mission opportunities, it is Christ who we follow. He promises to guide and strengthen us as we grow in his image and in the virtues of faith, hope and love.

In Christ we thank you for your, patience, faith and prayers.



#### Catechesis of the Good Shepherd News



In Level 1 of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, the children contemplated *The Parable of the Found Sheep*, the story of a sheep that was lost, but the Good Shepherd searched for it, found it,

and joyfully brought it home. In the second presentation of the month, *The Leaven*, the children wondered about how the Kingdom of God is like small grains of yeast that when mixed with flour will cause bread dough to double in size. The month ended with a gesture work from the Mass, *The Preparation of the Chalice*. The mingling of the water and wine is like our inseparable union with Jesus.

The Level 2 children started the month with the *Synthesis of the Mass*. After reviewing the parts of the Mass the children began to create their own missals. During the second week, the parable of the Ten Bridesmaids was presented. The children questioned what helps us meet Christ in our lives? What is the "oil" that we need to keep our light burning? That "oil" might be found in *the Maxims*, the last presentation of the month. Maxims are short moral teachings from Jesus that help us live our lives loving God and our neighbor.

As part of the <u>History of the Kingdom of God</u> study, *The Flood Typology* was presented in Level 3. The children reflected on how humankind was given a fresh start through God's covenant with Noah and his descendants. They also contemplated the moral parable of the *Workers in the Vineyard. The Maxims* were also presented and discussed.

#### Signs of Lent

As we enter the third week of Lent – why do we use purple in our liturgical spaces?

The color purple is associated with repentance. In Scripture, we are told that a purple robe was placed on Jesus during the crucifixion, and so purple evokes the pain and suffering of the crucifixion. In ancient times, purple was one of the most expensive colors to manufacture, and was therefore associated with royalty. Even though the purple robe was meant to mock Jesus, we know that Christ reigns over death, and so even during this repentant time we celebrate Christ's Resurrection and sovereignty.

#### **Gnostic Gospel Presentation**

Do You "Gneed" to "Gnow" about the Gnostic Gospels? Come join us for a lively discussion of heresy and humility as we discuss these mysterious texts. Allison Dooley, MATL, will present an overview of Gnosticism and the Gnostic gospels, and why these teachings were (and still are) rejected by the church. In this process of talking about what we don't believe as Catholics, we will gain a greater understanding of Church history, the nature of Scripture, and how to think theologically. All are invited on Sunday, March 26° following the 11:00 am Mass in Murphy Hall on the St. Edmund Campus. - > Evening Shelter Host (6:30 pm-10:00 pm)
  - Volunteers help get set-up for the evening, greet the shelter guests as they arrive help them to set up their sleeping area, host dinner, and interact with clients until lights out.
- > Overnight Attendant (10:00 pm-5:00 am)
  Volunteers support staff in ensuring a safe experience for the shelter guests.
- > Breakfast Host (5:00 am-7:00 am)
  Volunteers serve a light breakfast, help shelter guests exit and assist with light clean-up.
- Meal Provider (To be delivered at 7:00 pm)
  Volunteers donate and deliver a hot dinner meal, and/or a continental breakfast and/or a sack to-go lunches for 25 people.

As part of the *Renew My Church* initiative for the Oak Park Catholic community, a team of volunteers from the parishes of St. Catherine–St. Lucy and St. Giles and Ascension and St. Edmund has begun a feasibility study for transforming the St. Catherine–St. Lucy rectory into a social services community center that serves families of students at St. Catherine–St. Lucy School and other West Side schools.

St. Catherine-St. Lucy already hosts three social service organizations: part of the rectory is now a temporary emergency shelter operated by **Housing Forward**; the convent houses a residential program for women overcoming addiction run by **Sister House**; and **Beyond Hunger** has a cold storage facility in the garage of the rectory. The study group is divided into three committees: surveying the needs of West Side families and creating a business plan; completing a facility needs assessment of the rectory and convent; and developing a fundraising plan to generate the resources to launch and sustain the new project. # Food For Thought Pastor To the World

"At times our own light goes out, and is rekindled by a spark from another person. Each of us has cause to think with deep gratitude of those who have lighted the flame within us." (Albert Schweitzer)

Ten years ago tomorrow a puff of white smoke floated from the chimney of the Sistine Chapel In the Vatican. George Mario Bergoglio, an Argentinian Cardinal, was elected as the new Pope, and has chosen the name Francis. As a man of humility, mercy and love, from the center balcony at the Vatican, his message of what to expect in directing the barque of Peter was clear: a Pastoral Pope who welcomes people with open arms, bringing a special sensitivity for those caught at the margins, the poor, indigent, and those trapped in the tragedy of constant warfare. On that Blessed Day of Joy, Jesus at his side, he prayed with the crowd, asked them to pray for him, bowed his head in silence, then gave his blessing, and wished them all a good night.

His openness is refreshing as a cool breeze. He caused an early stir when a reporter asked about gay priests: "If someone is gay and searches for the Lord, and has good will, who am I to judge?" We saw in him a pastor more interested in encouraging them rather than judging them. In his homilies he has a way of getting to the heart of the matter that resonates with the people in the pew. But his pastoral life can make liberals a bit queasy. Early in his pontificate, the Pope was mentioning the devil more frequently than his predecessors. Seeing evil as something personified is not the way most moderns tend to think about evil, but Jesus had no such compunction. Popular piety expressed the idea that evil Is a powerful personification.

In his early years Pope Francis mixed with the crowd, stopping to hold and bless a mother's baby, or to caress a man with a disfiguring disease. These images showed someone who engaged the world through Jesus' eyes, defining "pastor." He has harsh words for hypocrisy; with people of God, he is generous and sympathetic. Injustice brings his ire. But he loves people pitched to the side of the road; he is at home with the poor, having seen extreme poverty. Francis walks into the world with open arms, and the world loves him for it. He's the world's parish priest, and that quality grounds and shapes every other aspect of his papacy.


