THE "CENTER" FOR LIFELONG FAITH FORMATION SURVEY RESULTS

QUESTION 2: WHAT WOULD YOU IMAGINE FOR A CATHOLIC CENTER FOR LIFELONG LEARNING?

122 people responded to this question. Respondents could write what they wanted in a free text answer. Several themes emerged, summarized below. These responses are quoted and paraphrased from what respondents wrote in their surveys, and grouped based on themes.

Some respondents spoke of a physical and/or digital space, which had space for resources and places for gathering. Some didn't mention a physical space at all; most responses were able to be grouped into these themes:

Welcoming

- · A place of diversity of all kinds
- Inviting to Catholics and non-Catholics
- Intergenerational
- A place for seekers, no matter where they are
- Offering events at diverse times, to be open to people at different stages of life

Fostering Growth in Faith

- Small faith groups where people can share what God is doing in their lives
- Spiritual Direction
- Retreats
- Sharing life experiences

Building Community

Learning: Programs for all ages

- Sponsored lectures and programs on the tenets of the Catholic faith
- Small groups to read and discuss Catholic authors
- Accessible learning for all levels of understanding
- Formation for children and adolescents

- Social gatherings based on interest
- Places for groups to meet with a common goal to improve the life of citizens that need assistance
- · Lay led endeavor
- Coordinated effort of both Catholic parishes and all four sites
- Rooted in Catholic identity but reaches out to other churches, synagogues and mosques
- · Broadens what the parishes can offer

Comments with Concerns: Questions were asked about the purpose and need for the center. Some felt faith is an independent journey. Others were concerned with the institution of the Catholic Church and divisive politics. Finally, concerns were raised about the role of the parish vs. the center.



Catholic Community of Oak Park Social Ministry Center on the SCSL Campus

History

Parishioners of all the Catholic churches in Oak Park have been involved in social ministries for years. By serving the homeless, the lonely, the mentally challenged, the hungry, those hospitalized, those seeking refuge, infants & toddlers, teens, and the elderly we have served God by serving each other.

During the Renew My Church (RMC) process, the recommendation of our collective churches to use the St. Catherine-St. Lucy (SCSL) campus, located at Washington and Austin Boulevards, as a social ministry center supported by both consolidated parishes in Oak Park was endorsed by Cardinal Cupich. This vision is an extension of the social justice outreach to Austin and beyond that has been occurring on each of our campuses and intended to add to those efforts, not replace them. SCSL is an ideal location to continue the outreach the Oak Park Catholic community has been engaged in to serve those in need on the west side of Chicago.

The SCSL School educates about 190 students, 85% of whom live in Austin, and is thriving. For many years, the SCSL ministry called Faith and Fellowship has served the needs of mental health-challenged residents in two facilities in Austin; the SCSL convent is now the residence of women recovering from addiction through SisterHouse, sponsored by the School Sisters of Notre Dame. The current rectory was converted in December to serve as an emergency shelter run by Housing Forward, and Beyond Hunger has a cold storage unit in the rectory's garage. As other social services agencies began inquiring about renting space on the campus, it was decided last fall to "take a breath and study the vision." At that point, Fr. Carl Morello, pastor of St. Catherine-St. Lucy and St. Giles Parish, commissioned a Feasibility Study for the re-use of the SCSL rectory.

Feasibility Committee

Fr. Carl asked Jack Crowe (from St. Catherine-St. Lucy and St. Giles) and Dan Doody (from Ascension and St. Edmund) to serve as co-chairs of the Feasibility Study Group. Their work began in October and was placed on hold when it was decided part of the 2nd floor of the rectory would be leased to Housing Forward. When the shelter was opened in January 2023, the Feasibility Study resumed.

Dan Doody introduced the Feasibility Committee organization and model to our collective parishes through the church bulletins in an article that ran for three weeks in late February and early March. Questions were encouraged and interested volunteers invited to participate. An article on the Feasibility Study ran in the Wednesday Journal and Austin Times in March. The Feasibility Study group has three committees: Facilities (working on the physical structure and needs of the rectory), Outreach (seeking input through surveys, visits to social service organizations, personal dialogue with leaders in the Austin community, and our various parish ministries) and Development (identifying both financial and human resources required for long-term success).

Currently there are thirteen dedicated volunteers working diligently on the work of the committees. Most importantly, the findings and recommendations of this committee will be presented to our pastors, staff, and parishioners once the committee's work is completed, sometime this summer.

The anticipated Social Services Center is a long-term commitment by the people of our Oak Park Catholic parishes. Once the Feasibility Study is completed and presented to our parishes, the next steps in the process will be identified. We pray for the Spirit to continue to lead us as we move forward.

Intercultural Immigrant Ministry: Planning to Host Another Migrant Family

The Catholic Parishes of Oak Park (St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy and St. Giles Parish and Ascension and St. Edmund Parish) are submitting a request for funding to Catholic Charities to partially support a second migrant family for at least six months. Catholic Charities will act as case management, ensuring that the family is complying with all legal migrant requirements and applying for any benefits to which they are entitled. They will also accompany the parish team, identifying families who will be good fits for the program, training the mentors, helping to secure an apartment, and maintaining regular communication with the parish team.

Volunteers are needed to accompany the family during their first few months in activities such as shopping, using public transportation, assisting with communication, and becoming comfortable with a new area and language. Ability to speak Spanish is ideal but not required. Finding and moving needed furniture and household items will also require volunteer assistance. Children will need to be enrolled in school and accompanied. Ongoing fundraising will be needed to support the family.



Social justice and action: Kralik family values

In 1999, when Katie was living in Berwyn and David lived in Oak Park, they were each looking for something more in their church experience. Katie wanted the sense of engagement she had experienced in college at the Newman Center. David wanted a church with a strong commitment to social justice. In a visit to St. Giles Church, they saw an announcement in the parish bulletin about a special liturgy of the Family Mass.

The next Sunday, David went to the 10:00 am Mass in the gym. He met several community members who invited him to a meeting of the Action for Justice ministry that evening. When Katie attended Mass the following Sunday, she was invited to sign up for the Women's Advent Night. "It felt like a place where people do church, not just where people receive church," she said recently.

After they got married in 2001, their involvement in the community increased. Even after they moved to



Service and social justice have been unifying values for the Kralik family. Over the years, Katie and David have been liturgy coordinators, sacristans, and eucharistic ministers. David has been a member and leader of the Family Mass Coordinating Board and a member and leader of the Action for Justice ministry. Katie has been a member of the Liturgy Roundtable for nearly a decade. She has also been a catechist and is currently leader of the Level Two catechists in the parish Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program. Nathan and Rachel help with audio-video technology that has enabled streaming of outdoor and gym Masses.

Some years ago, the family joined other parish volunteers in providing a hot dinner once a month to homeless people sheltered in the PADS program at First United Church of Oak Park. As PADS became Housing Forward, and the Covid pandemic required other arrangements, shelter at various church locations has been replaced with individual rooms at a hotel. Though the team misses the personal interaction with our sheltered neighbors, they still enjoy assembling the meals together in McDonough Hall once a month. On any second Monday of the month, you might find Katie scooping mashed potatoes, Rachel slicing meatloaf, and David and Nathan packing the meals for delivery.

"The amount of gratitude that people have for this small offering of a hot dinner is just heartwarming... and it helps put so many other things in perspective," she said. "It is our duty to hold our blessings loosely and pass them along as best we can."

Katie is meal coordinator for the second Monday of the month's team. Volunteers sign up for one or more tasks as their schedules allow, using an easy internet form. "This is a simple, practical opportunity for people who want to fill a great need in our community. For someone who likes to cook, or doesn't have a lot of time, or doesn't mind throwing an extra package of juice boxes in the grocery cart, this is a flexible effort with a really big payoff."

Spiritual Classics - Dorothy Day

Loaves and Fishes by Dorothy Day is the Spiritual Classics choice for our next discussion on **Tuesday**, **June 6**, **at 7:30 pm** over Zoom. The discussion will be led by Marci Madary, Director of Lifelong Formation at St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy and St. Giles Parish in Oak Park. All Oak Park parishes are welcome.

Dorothy Day was an American journalist and social activist who became a Catholic and continued a life of activism. In the 1930s, Day worked closely with fellow activist Peter Maurin to establish the Catholic Worker movement which today continues to provide direct aid for the poor and homeless. *Loaves and Fishes* is full of memorable stories about Dorothy Day and the Catholic Worker movement, based on poignant examples and inspired descriptions of individuals in the movement. A revered figure within the U.S. Catholic community, Day's cause for canonization was recently opened by the Catholic Church.
