Spiritual Classics – Dorothy Day

Loaves and Fishes by Dorothy Day is the Spiritual Classics choice for our next discussion on **Tuesday**, **June 6, at 7:30 pm** over Zoom. The discussion will be led by Marci Madary, Director of Lifelong Formation at St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy and St. Giles Parish in Oak Park. All Oak Park parishes are welcome.

Dorothy Day was an American journalist and social activist who became a Catholic and continued a life of activism. In the 1930s, Day worked closely with fellow activist Peter Maurin to establish the Catholic Worker movement which today continues to provide direct aid for the poor and homeless. *Loaves and Fishes* is full of memorable stories about Dorothy Day and the Catholic Worker movement, based on poignant examples and inspired descriptions of individuals in the movement. A revered figure within the U.S. Catholic community, Day's cause for canonization was recently opened by the Catholic Church.

Pipe Organ Refurbishment Is Back on Track. Contract Signed!

"Let us make music to the Lord," the psalmist wrote. We are excited to announce that the sound of a pipe organ once again will be heard at the St. Giles worship site in 2024. Here is a bit of the history of our current organ. In 1949, the original St. Giles pipe organ installation was poorly designed. In fact, some of the installation was unstable and dangerous. The chambers are so small that technicians could not access them to make proper repairs. There are holes in the flooring and the electric wiring is not up to code.

The original organ has many missing parts. More than 32 years ago, an attempt was made to repair the organ. The company that did the work took out many of the best pipes and even the original console (the part where one sits and plays) and replaced it with an old electronic console. Over one third of the organ does not work or is missing parts – that means hundreds of pipes! The pipes that remain are bent or damaged from improper handling or careless tuning.



As a result, the organ has not been functional for quite some time. Much of the organ simply does not work at all. Because of all the missing parts and the poor installation, it would not be cost effective or even possible to try and restore the organ.

The project, although stalled for some years now, has not been forgotten. Sue Kaszynski, the Music Director, Fr. Carl and Matt Brophy, the Operations Director, have been working on the organ project for the past year. They have investigated the availability of organs at closed churches that would work for a church our size and with the space allotted for the pipes and chambers.

The parish partnered with Berghaus Pipe Organ Builders. Berghaus is a local company that is one of the finest pipe organ builders in the

The organ is under pitch. The trumpet and flute pipes in the organ chamber, which are used for weddings, funerals, holidays, and other special occasions, can no longer be tuned since they are permanently damaged or missing. The sound is often unpleasant because of unsteady wind pressure caused by poor workmanship.



country. Berghaus identified an organ in a church in Chicago that will be demolished, and the organ must be removed before the demolition. The organ is a 1928 Austin Universal Air located in the Second Church of Christ, Scientist in Chicago. Pipe organs can last for centuries due to their fine craftmanship. Many pipe organs in Europe are centuries old.

Berghaus would remove the pipe organ, refurbish, repair, improve, and install the organ in the two organ chamber rooms located behind the St. Joseph Altar. Additional information about the project will be shared in next week's bulletin.

> Site Captain

Site captains recruit and manage a team of volunteers from their congregation to fill volunteer needs and/or meals for a night of shelter operation.

> Evening Shelter Host (6:30 pm-10:00 pm)

Volunteers help get set-up for the evening, greet the shelter guests as they arrive help them to set up their sleeping area, host dinner, and interact with clients until lights out.

> Overnight Attendant (10:00 pm-5:00 am)

Volunteers support staff in ensuring a safe experience for the shelter guests.

- > Breakfast Host (5:00 am-7:00 am) Volunteers serve a light breakfast, help shelter guests exit and assist with light clean-up.
- > Meal Provider (To be delivered at 7:00 pm)

Volunteers donate and deliver a hot dinner meal, and/or a continental breakfast and/or a sack to-go lunches for 15 people.




The Senior Corner

Intercultural Immigrant Ministry: Planning to Host Another Migrant Family

The Catholic Parishes of Oak Park (St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy and St. Giles Parish and Ascension and St. Edmund Parish) are submitting a request for funding to Catholic Charities to partially support a second migrant family for at least six months. Catholic Charities will act as case management, ensuring that the family is complying with all legal migrant requirements and applying for any benefits to which they are entitled. They will also accompany the parish team, identifying families who will be good fits for the program, training the mentors, helping to secure an apartment, and maintaining regular communication with the parish team.

Volunteers are needed to accompany the family during their first few months in activities such as shopping, using public transportation, assisting with communication, and becoming comfortable with a new area and language. Ability to speak Spanish is ideal but not required. Finding and moving needed furniture and household items will also require volunteer assistance. Children will need to be enrolled in school and accompanied. Ongoing fundraising will be needed to support the family.

Food For Thought Deliver Us from Evil

"Brothers and sisters, rejoice. Mend your ways, encourage one another, agree with one another, live in peace, and the God of love and peace will be with you... The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with all of you." (2 Corinthians 13:11-13)

What does evil look like? It's mostly heard in the religious world, as though in our modern world malevolent force is an outdated myth. Nevertheless, we do witness the power of arrogance and lies to corrupt social cohesion and integrity.

We watch as our politicians take the global financial system to the brink to score media points. What collective spirit blinds us to truth and common sense? Is it not evil turning us against one another, hurtling toward self-destruction?

The erosion of ethical standards within the financial industry, on whom global commerce integrity depends, can wreak havoc on investments and savings of most ordinary people. Dark money has corrupted the process of handling trillions of dollars every day and hour.

At Pentecost we prayed for a full measure of the Holy spirit. Add our commitment, As we pray to God: "...Deliver us from evil, for thine is the Kingdom, and the Power, and the Glory, Forever, Amen."
