As we continue our journey in Renew My Church with Building a New Reality in our united parishes and our larger Catholic Community, today's readings offer some good guidance and words of reassurance. The first reading establishes the theme that runs throughout today's scripture passages: We can always rely on the Lord! In the face of enemies on all sides, long suffering Jerimiah puts his trust in the Lord. The psalmist turns to the Lord, whose kindness is constant. Saint Paul points out that God's grace, given by Jesus on the cross, is greater than the sins of humanity. Jesus then assures his disciples that God watches over them to the smallest detail. In this time of change and renewal, where do we need to seek God's word to reassure us as well?

I have heard many folks express concern for me as I take on a greater leadership role in our two united parishes here in Oak Park. I have also heard concerns for the parishes, how we identify ourselves individually and now looking at a new reality. What will this mean for us? Yes, there are many questions and honest concerns. Let me remind you of something Jesus once said, "My Peace I give you." (John 14:27)

Substitute positive, encouraging thoughts for negative ones. Let us practice patience and act with love by assuming the best in others. And let's all remember; God is in control!

As you may recall from previous bulletins, we have extended the use of the rectory on the St. Catherine-St. Lucy site for Housing Forward as an overnight shelter for the year. Following the mission of reaching out to those in need, we are hoping to arrange for the migrants living in the nearby Austin Police station to have a place to shower twice a week. I will keep you posted on the arrangements and what is planned.



Food For Thought "Do Not Be Afraid"

"The Lord is with me, like a mighty champion. My persecutors will stumble, they will not triumph. In their failure they will be put to utter shame, to lasting, unforgettable confusion." (Jeremiah 20:13)

Jeremiah wavers between fear and faith in his turmoil, but he comes down on the side of faith that God will be with him. His concept: That his sufferings are from God testing him, but God will be vengeful towards his detractors, ideally for him to watch and savor.

The hope that God will protect the righteous and smite the wicked runs through Hebrew Scripture. Many Christians think that of Jesus today. Such extreme thinking defends prejudices, war and capital punishment, insisting it is godly to punish evildoers.

Such thinking is tragic, but is understood: Who would not want cruel bullies to suffer? Persistent persecution calls for vengeance. What's the gospel antidote for this thinking? As Jesus sent his disciples out to preach, he said to "fear no one," that truth will win out.

"Don't be afraid of those who kill the body, but cannot kill the soul; rather, fear the one who can kill both the body and the soul." (Matthew 10:28). The implication's that we should fear God, whose destructive power can do much more harm than crosses and daggers.

"All who take the sword will perish by the sword." He never promoted vengeance of any kind. Perhaps it was a warning to his disciples: Physical harm's nothing next to the power revenge has to eat away one's spiritual, psychological and bodily well-being.

He said hatred and vengeance do more harm to the perpetrator than to the victim. With no tit-for-tat, he begins from God's love. He would likely remind us our prowess comes from attitudes motivating our actions. Wit can cut an adversary off at the knees.

Such exercises tip a delicate balance; They do not change the world. Love of enemy does, disarming and nourishing everyone involved. Paul taught the Romans what changes history is the overflowing gift of Jesus Christ. May it flower among us!
