Fr. Carl's Corner



Dear Parishioners,

Last weekend, I traveled to St. Mary-of-the-Woods, Indiana, to celebrate with Sr. Sue Paweski, a Sister of Providence, the 25th anniversary of the taking of her vows. The Sisters of Providence are a community of Catholic women religious who collaborate with others to create a more just and hope-filled world through prayer, education, service and advocacy. I had never been to St Mary-of-the-Woods. It is built in a beautifully wooded area and houses a shrine to Saint Mother Theodore Guerin, the foundress of the Sisters of Providence. Mother Theodore also founded a school, convent and church on that very property in the mid 1800's. She came from France expecting reasonable lodging and a building to begin her school for girls. However, when she arrived, there was nothing but a long cabin where the local priest said Mass. He was able to secure lodging with a nearby family who farmed some of the land and this is where Mother Guerin and her associates stayed for seven years as they began to build what now stands as the mother house for the Sisters of Providence.

I stopped for a visit at the shrine to Saint Mother Theodore Guerin and was moved as I read her story and knelt at her casket which contains her remains. Her courageous and faith-filled story includes praying to the God of Providence, trusting that God brought her to this desolate place, and accepting that this is where she needed to be. It was overwhelming to consider what her work, through her faith, had accomplished as I knelt beside her casket these many years later. And then, I thought about you and me, the communities being served, and the changes and new territory we are chartering with Renew My Church (RMC) and now Building a New Reality.

This prayer, on a card I picked up at the shrine, written by a Sister of Providence, spoke to me and I hope it will speak to you as well.

God whose name is providence, God whose name is love, you have created each of us with special loving care. Remembering that we are connected to every bit of this boundless and beautiful universe, we turn to you with all our hearts and pray, show us the path, teach us the way.

God whose name is providence, God whose name is love, you hold each of us close and care for us every day of our lives.

Because we want to thank you by living in harmony with everyone and everything, we pray, show us the path, teach us the way, help us to share your love today.



2023/24 Program Offerings

PREP is designed to give pre-school children (ages 3-5 years - PK3, PK4 and K) an introduction to basic Catholic Christian Principles.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD (CGS) is a faith formation program based on the Bible, the Liturgy of our Church, and educational principles of Maria Montessori. Children and Catechists gather to further experience their relationship with Jesus, the Good Shepherd, and their life in the church. The CGS program has three multi-age levels for children in grades Pre-K through 6th. CGS - LEVEL I - 3 to 6 Years Old (PK3, PK4 and K) CGS - LEVEL II - 6 to 9 Years Old (GRADES 1, 2 and 3) CGS - LEVEL III - 9 to 12 Years Old (GRADES 4, 5 and 6)

Spirit and Light

FAMILY RELIGIOUS EDUCATION is an opportunity for the entire family, parents and children in Grades 1-6, to grow in faith. The child along with parents attend a monthly meeting where there is time for family conversation as well as age-appropriate activities. The remainder of the month, students work with parents at home using a text book.

TRADITIONAL RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (TRE) is a text-based faith formation program for 1st – 8th grades. The program is designed for students to learn about our Catholic faith, teachings, and traditions.

MIDDLE SCHOOL MINISTRY is a religious education opportunity for 7th and 8th grade students. Learning occurs primarily through discussion and activities at tables with a table leader. Students meet in person twice a month and have an at-home activity once a month.

SPRED (Special Religious Development) is a program of the Archdiocese of Chicago whose purpose is two-fold: the inclusion of the developmentally disabled into the liturgical and community faith life of the parish and the formation of a small faith community where both special friends and their catechists nurture their faith. Ages 6-10 years old.

perspectives on Chicago's West Side, on his work and on the need for legal aid there. After his presentation, we will talk a bit about PBN and how you, as an attorney, can be a part of the solution.

Food For Thought The Purity of Our Faith

"Oh, the depth of the riches and wisdom and knowledge of God! How inscrutable are his judgments and how unsearchable his ways! "For who has known the mind of the Lord, or who has been his counselor? Or who has given the Lord anything That the may be repaid?" From him and through him and for him are all things. To him be glory forever. Amen" (Romans 11:33-36)

Indeed, deeply inscrutable judgements, as our piece two weeks ago has Peter being Jesus' choice to become his Rock. It does appear that Jesus chose Peter not for what he might accomplish, or for his wisdom or his strength, but for his willingness to change and learn, to cultivate ever-broader vision.

Peter's faith supported him as he grew in his commitment: keeper of the keys for a frail Church. By professing Jesus as the Christ, Jesus' followers all pledged to follow him, not flawlessly, but faithful enough to stand up and keep going after they had fallen. When we're asked by Christ, just what do we say?

On Sundays when we profess the beauty and strength of our faith, does historical/ philosophical language of the creed cushion us from the radicality of Peter's simple, compelling commitment statement: "You are Christ ?" Do the readings, the creed, the commandment "Do this in memory of me" inspire awe?

Today we find ourselves called to answer Jesus' question for ourselves. We don't need to figure it out—and live it—alone. God's revelation' comes through community, word and sacrament. And in that, we can believe, and that's awesome. Peter had come through the crucible damaged but recovered from weaknesses.

Peter was restored to love and service by Jesus' resurrection. The warmth of our devotion to him is a clear test of the purity of our faith.

We can identify with Peter in our own weaknesses. But it will be his privilege and the privilege of his successors in the Petrine Ministry to unlock the riches of the revelation of Jesus Christ entrusted to the Church.
