

Fr. Carl's Corner



Three members of our Oak Park Catholic Community will receive special awards at Holy Name Cathedral this weekend. Cardinal Cupich will lead the prayer service and their names will be called to recognize their dedicated and selfless service to our community and those we serve.

The Bishop Quarter Award is given to one who understands the Church's teachings on social justice and uses their talents to deepen the life of the Church by their consistent and extraordinary ministry. This award is given to only one person in each Vicariate. I am proud to announce that Celine Woznica will be given this award for the selfless work she has done for the migrants in our area and for creating the shower program at the Rectory on our St. Catherine-St. Lucy site.

The Christifidelis Award is given to a member of the community who also shows dedicated service. From Ascension and St. Edmund, the award will be given to Dan Doody for his work

with Housing Forward and the Feasibility Study Committee which was organized to gather the needed information to build ministry outreach at the St. Catherine-St. Lucy Rectory.

From our St. Catherine-St. Lucy and St. Giles Family Mass Community, Margaret Rudnik will also receive this award for her work with Celine organizing housing for the migrant family we have sponsored, her assistance with the shower program, and her support in arranging food, clothing and needed volunteers.

Congratulations to all! Thank you for helping us remember who we are as Church, and living in the light of Christ as we care for each other, especially those who are most in need.

This past Monday, the Archdiocese held a Day of Renewal at the Rosemont Theater. Over 1,000 clergy and staff attended. The focus was on moving from the structural changes of Renew My Church into the Building a New Realty stage.

Some structural changes are still being made and Bishop Casey, Vicar General, acknowledged how difficult and painful this stage can be. He expressed gratitude for the prayers, patience and persistence individuals and communities have shown throughout this challenging process. Having come through this, most parishes are embarking on an exciting new phase, growing into missionary disciples. We are on the way, however not there yet. Core elements are Prayer, Vision Casting, (which we are doing with the ministry center idea at St. Catherine-St. Lucy and with our Spirit and Light Collaborative) Leading as a Team, Accompaniment and Hospitality. Pieces of this are beginning to take shape, but we still have work to do.

Perhaps one of my most important takeaways came from Fr. John Riccardo, a priest from the Diocese of Detroit. He founded Acts XXIX (29) a program to help proclaim the Gospel in a compelling way in this age God has chosen us to live.

There are only 28 chapters in the Acts of the Apostles. He explained, in more detail than I will here, that Acts XXIX (29) is meant to remind us that each of us is being written into the next chapter! We are called, in our own unique way, to share the mission of Christ, to share the work of ministry and remind one another where our salvation comes from, God who loves us.

It was a well-organized and structured day, and I was happy to have been a part of this Day of Renewal. And honestly, I was a bit exhausted when I left thinking of all that is before us, the challenges **and** the opportunities! Come Holy Spirit, guide us and give us strength for the journey we are on.

I also want to share that I will be away from October 6 through October 18 on a much needed (and I might add well deserved) vacation to Italy! You will be under the capable care of our pastoral staffs. Fr. Rex, Fr. Carlton, Fr. Unz and others who help with sacramental needs will be available as needed. I have asked Fr. Carlton to write for the bulletin while I am away. He has become the Catholic representative for our Oak Park Police Department and is working with Deacon Kevin Morgan on the Eucharistic Revival. Stay tuned and he will share more details about both.

As we enter into Respect Life month, let's take to heart these words of St. Basil the Great, "You need only to look at the vine to be reminded of your own nature... Each of us has been grafted onto the church by faith the Lord calls branches, and he urges us to bear much fruit."

Have a joyous week ahead. With you a Christian. For you a priest.



Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Catechist Gathering "Who Is The Child?"





Parish Pastoral Council

Several years ago, the Chicago Archdiocese embarked upon the Renew My Church journey. In part, the journey was prompted by the fact that fewer people were attending Mass and fewer vocations to the priesthood. We have made some difficult decisions along the way, which led to the unification of the Oak Park Catholic churches into two newly formed parishes, and we have now embarked on the second leg of the journey. We are now working on Building a New Reality.

Fr. Carl has pointed out that in Building a New Reality, we are coming together in ways that support our mission to support one another in living and growing our faith. We are also bringing others to come to know Jesus. One of the first tasks in that mission was forming new Parish Pastoral Councils for each parish.

The Parish Pastoral Council of the unified St. Catherine of Siena-St. Lucy, St. Giles, and the St. Giles Family Mass Community was appointed and has met twice since. On August 14, the council members identified a primary goal of supporting and promoting a vision for hospitality and bringing people together. As we move from maintaining our faith to living it with a mission, our focus is on welcoming all who come to church in our unified parish. Our measure of success is that all feel welcome and at home here. As a first step, the Parish Pastoral Council hosted Mix and Mingle hospitality following each Mass the weekend of September 9-10 at both worship sites. It was a wonderful opportunity for continued conversation on the unification process. The Parish Pastoral Council has decided to meet on the third Monday of every month.

On September 18, the first item on the agenda was a discussion of the things that we are hearing from our parishioners. Included in this "News from the Pews:" some parishioners shared a feeling that many of the changes taking place involve Masses and activities being discontinued at St. Catherine-St. Lucy, with nothing being added to replace them. Others pointed out that they might be more likely to attend Mass at the another church location if the Mass times were more staggered. Two things that distinguish St. Catherine-St. Lucy are the Praise Choir and the *Lead Me, Guide Me* worship missals (geared towards African-American Catholics), both of which are being under-used. The administrative cost of all sacraments has increased. A lot of parishioners want to be involved, and they want more transparency. There was an additional suggestion that parishioners wear name tags as we continue to get to know one another. The unified Parish Pastoral Council is in its infancy and feeling its way; however, we would like parishioners to know that they can expect at least a monthly article in our bulletin following each meeting.

Fr. Carl reported that Information Sharing Sessions have been planned and are being held to discuss the feasibility of repurposing the unused Rectory space at St. Catherine-St. Lucy as a base for social ministry outreach to the residents of Austin. This has been termed the "evangelization" component of Renew My Church—drawing people to the faith through service. The Feasibility Study Team has invested countless hours in an effort to identify the unmet needs of Austin and the extended West Side of Chicago. These efforts were recognized in a positive article in the *Wednesday Journal*. They are also looking to reach out to a larger audience for fundraising to avoid putting all the financial burden on the parishioners. The Praise Choir is currently scheduled to sing at Mass at both St. Catherine-St. Lucy and at St. Giles worship sites. Recognizing the request for more transparency, updated social media pages can be developed.

The Parish Pastoral Council has a liaison on the Finance Committee, through which we learned that the fiscal year ends in June. St. Giles ended in a deficit last year and looks like it could this year, too. In general, while unexpected expenses do occur, St. Giles maintains its campus with a capital plan. St. Catherine-St. Lucy breaks even with help from benefactors, but long-term projects are not in the budget. The other Oak Park churches also do not have long-term maintenance budgets. It is foreseeable that the community will need to make some hard decisions in the near future.

Following the September 9-10 hospitality weekend, the Parish Pastoral Council determined that these opportunities of welcoming need to continue. We will continue to use these Mix and Mingle events to get to know one another better and to facilitate greater communication and awareness. Some ideas to make this happen are to ask everyone to wear name tags, provide a Q & A table, mount a QR code to a form so parishioners can ask questions and send comments using their phones, and to highlight the parish ministries. The next hospitality weekend for St. Catherine-St. Lucy and St. Giles will be October 14-15. St. Giles Family Mass Community will continue celebrating Hospitality Sunday on the first Sunday of each month.

The next Parish Council meeting is scheduled for October 25, when we will meet with a representative from the Archdiocese.

Be an Advocate for Victims of Domestic Violence.



True change happens when everyday people contribute to large movements.

You don't have to be famous, on TV, or have a huge online following to make a difference. It starts with the small step of believing the stories of survivors, and then committing to learn more about the problems facing those survivors and their children.

Everyday you can be an advocate just by chatting with others at school, work, church, wherever. Let others know you care about domestic violence. Wear purple during Domestic Violence Awareness month in October. When you're asked what it's about, explain why you are concerned about domestic violence.

If someone says, "Well, why don't they just leave," respond with, "Why are the abuser's actions allowed to go unpunished?" Misunderstandings about domestic violence are perpetuated because people simply accept them as the truth. Start a conversation that might lead to a changed mind.

You can let lawmakers know that protecting domestic violence survivors through strong and safe policy is important to you. When Archdiocese of Chicago Domestic Violence Outreach (ACDVO) sends you a call to action on pending legislation, you can reach out to your legislator.

Public Forum

Discussing a proposed plan for social ministry outreach to Austin residents from St. Catherine – St. Lucy campus

Since January of 2023, at Fr. Carl Morello's direction, a group of volunteers from the Oak Park Catholic Community has been studying the feasibility of repurposing the unused rectory at St. Catherine – St. Lucy (SCSL) as a base for social ministry outreach to the residents of Austin. This initiative is a direct outgrowth of the third stated outcome of Renew My Church for the Oak Park Catholic Community:

"The Archdiocese affirms the Oak Park grouping's vision to use St. Catherine – St. Lucy campus as a base for powerful ministry outreach to the West Side of Chicago... supported by the entire Oak Park Catholic community."

A primary motivation of the Feasibility Study is addressing the needs in Austin, beginning with SCSL School families. This project will be an OP Catholic Community response to our neighbors' identification of need. The Renew My Church vision offers a unique opportunity to collectively provide this support.

The volunteer group recently submitted its Feasibility Report to Fr. Carl, who has encouraged the group to share its findings with the community for feedback before a final plan is developed.

The Feasibility Study Team is holding a series of public forums throughout the community from now until late November at a variety of locations and times to engage the community as fully as possible. The public forum will feature a 30-minute presentation by members of the Feasibility Study Team followed by a question-and-answer session.

Several public forums have taken place, with others still to come. Please review the schedule of the planned forums and plan to attend the one that is most convenient for you. Please bring family members and friends.


